STATEMENT OF THE U. S. FINANCES.—  
 The following statement of finances was furnished by the Treasury Department, on Monday, to the House committee of ways and means:

Aggregate of debt bearing interest in coin.....	\$1,087,556,438 80
Interest on sixty and a-half millions of debt bearing interest in currency.....	608 570 00
Interest on about thirty millions of debt on which interest has ceased, about.....	350,000 00

The amount of suspended requisitions include all unpaid requisitions for every branch of the public service.

It is stated at the Department that at the date, February 13th, this amount has been reduced about \$900,000,000; also that the Department intends paying the Army of the Potomac next week week.

The gale on Sunday last was very severe in the Chesapeake Bay. All vessels were compelled to seek harbor, and were completely encased in ice. Mr. Varley, a pilot, who came to Baltimore, yesterday; in the steamer Georgiana, of the Norfolk line, reports the ice in the bay solid to Sharp's Island, and a thin sheet of ice clear across the bay, from and above Cove Point. The pilot boats Invincible and Coquette, cruising off Cape Henry, were blown off the coast and received some damage. A three masted propeller was off the cape with a signal of distress, but the pilot boats, being covered with ice, were unable to render any assistance. Two barges filled with men belonging to the British frigate Galatea, in Hampton Roads, which were sent to rescue a boat with one seaman in it, were carried on the beach near Cape Henry, and it is supposed all hands perished. A steamtug was sent to their assistance, but the gale was so severe that she was obliged to put back.

Mr. F. L. Stein, the Norfolk correspondent of the Philadelphia Press, in his letter of the 11th, says:

"A mass meeting of citizens will be held this evening to give expression to their opinion in relation to civil law. His Excellency Gov. F. H. Pierpont will preside. The Governor arrived in Norfolk on Thursday evening last, and is busy with the details necessary to a thorough organization of the civil government."

The London correspondent of the Boston Traveller says that the Count of Paris has written a letter criticising McClellan's military policy, as well as his great mistake in leading the political movement of last fall.
