

**GENERAL NEWS.**

A special di-patch from Frankfort, Ky., says a majority of the Committee on the Judiciary in the State Senate have reported that the constitutional amendment abolishing slavery be rejected. The minority report insists upon compensation as a condition precedent to the ratification.

Lord Amberley, the eldest son of Earl Russell, has made his political debut, and attracted considerable attention by a speech made by him in favor of reform, at Leeds.

The London Times editorially finds fault with the legal opinion given by Mr. William M. Evarts, as to the right of European creditors to recover debts in America on a specie basis.

The great trotting match, in Paris, between the American horse Shepherd and the French horse Express, resulted in a victory for the American horse, winning by one hundred yards.

Several capitalists have combined to establish a line of first class steamers between New York and Providence as soon as practicable. Their proposed capital is \$500,000, of which about one half has been subscribed in New York.

The Northern Advocate says that there are in the prisoners' camp, in Elmira, at the present time, sixteen hundred and eleven prisoners who make a profession of religion.— They have come from twelve different States, Virginia and North Carolina furnishing the largest numbers.

Mr. Goodwin Smith has written a letter on "American Finances," which appears in the London News. "I went to America," says he, "convinced that amid so much that was truly great, the financial administration was the weak point; and I have returned with that confirmed."

The report that a fleet of twenty one vessels arrived at New York several days ago, with 11,000 bales of cotton from Savannah, was erroneous. Only three have arrived, and they came into port on Thursday. The captain of one of the vessels reports that the fleet were dispersed by the gale of the 12th instant.

Maj. John Mitchell, the Irish refugee, has reported to Gov. Magrath, of South Carolina, and has been assigned to duty in that department.

The U. S. internal revenue for January just past, amounted to the enormous sum of \$31,076,902 89—over a million of dollars a day.

A general hospital is now being established at Marienburg, Va., for the troops of Gen. Sheridan's command, with accommodations for a large number of patients.

The Washington papers now give accounts of the "State dinners" given by the dignitaries in Washington, the guests, the dresses of the ladies, &c., in the manner of the Court journals of Europe.

The subcommittee of the Committee on Commerce of the House, have gone to Norfolk, to take testimony in reference to the cotton operations and transactions under the permit of the Treasury Department.

Franklin W. Smith, a Boston merchant, has been convicted by court martial of frauds in the quality of articles furnished to the U. S. Government, and sentenced to two years imprisonment and \$25,000 fine.
