U. S. CONGRESS—In the Senate, yesterday, a communication was received from the Secretary of War declining to report the number of troops furnished by each State. The reports from the committee of conference on the army and navy appropriation bills were concurred in. After an ineffectual effort to take up the Louisiana bill, the internal revenue bill was considered. The vote laying aside the Louisiana bill was 34 to 12.

In the House, Mr. Morrill introduced a bill to tax foreign liquors 50 cts. per gallon, cotton 5 cts. per lb., and illuminating oils 40 cts. per gallon, which was made the special order at the night session. The Senate amendments to the fortification bill were concurred in, reducing the appropriation very much. The general appropriation bill was taken up and the Senate amendment adding the deficiency bill with the appropriation for extra compensation of employees of the House stricken out, was concurred in.

At the evening session of the Senate, Mr. Sherman explained the provisions and policy of the internal revenue bill. The finance committee's amendment were adopted.

In the House, the enrollment bill was passed; the loan bill was considered, but no final action taken.

Bairon Leibig recommends a soup for infants which he believes superior to cow's milk in cases where children must be reared "by hand." It is prepared as follows, and can be easily tried. The great chemist says his own grandchildren thrive upon it:

"Half an ounce of wheaten flour and an equal quantity of malt flour; seven grains and a quarter of bi-carbonate of potash and one ounce of water are to be well mixed; five ounces of cow's milk are then to be added, and the whole put on a gent'e fire; when the mixture to thicken it is removed from the fire, stirred during five minutes, heated and stirred again till it becomes fluid, and finally made to boil. After the separation of the bran by a sieve, it is ready for use. By boiling it for a few minutes it loses all taste of the flour."

A bounty jumper forced his way into the Theatre at Cincinnati, a few evenings ago, thinking that he was safe from detection. While the performance was in progress, however, he observed that he was watched by one of his old officers.
