

LOCAL NEWS.

LEGISLATIVE.—In the House, on Saturday, Mr. Kellam introduced a bill, entitled "An Act to authorize the Board of Public Works to dispose of the State's interest in the Alexandria, Loudoun and Hampshire Railroad," which was read the first time and referred to the Committee on Roads and Internal Navigation.

Col. Welles, yesterday, sent to Washington from Alexandria, H. Simpson, 35th Virginia battery, and J. E. Kirkpatrick, 49th Virginia infantry, who were committed to the Old Capitol as prisoners of war, having been captured by the 8th Illinois cavalry. Kirkpatrick was captured once before, and took the oath of allegiance.

U. S. HOSPITALS.—First Division U. S. Hospital, with all its branches, in this place, have been relinquished. Nothing remains of Second Division but Sickle's Barracks, all its other Branches having been vacated. Third Division still remains, with the exception of McVeigh Branch which was vacated Monday week.

ACCIDENT.—The steam Ferry boat Mariner had one of her steam pipes injured, last evening, and was delayed in her trips until the proper repairs were made.
