**TO TREE PLANTERS**—Those about to set out young trees, or fruit bearing or ornamental shrubs, should remember that the great leading object is to obtain a thrifty growth on the last year's wood of the cherries. The latter may have half of each yearling shoot removed.

But it is of the utmost importance that this cutting back be done before there is any swelling or expanding of the buds, otherwise the growth will be checked by the operation, instead of accelerated. This is especially the case with cherries and plums, which start more feebly than peaches and grapes. A main reason why cutting back has failed with some, is doing the work after the buds have swollen or leaves expanded.

Henry Ward Beecher, in an article published in the Watchman and Reflector, in reference to his late visit to Washington, thus alludes to President Lincoln:—"The President seems well, and in good spirits. His face is more wrinkled and if possible drier than ever. But he seems tough and elastic, and far more likely to live a hundred years than two years ago he was to live ten."

The Washington correspondent of the N. Y. Tribune says:—"The Senate having been daily disgraced by the presence of members unfit to be in decent society, Senator Wilson will speedily introduce a resolution expelling every private bottle and demijohn from the rooms of the Senate, as a remedial measure." This resolution has been since adopted in the Senate.

In the Baltimore Conference M. E. Church, yesterday, it was decided to hold the next Conference in Baltimore City Station. Dr. Nadal, President of the Court which tried the case of Rev. J. N. Davis vs. Rev. John Lannahan, reported that the charges were not sustained, as the unanimous verdict of the Court.

Both Houses of Congress passed the bill to establish a Home for Disabled U. S. Soldiers and Sailors. The incorporators are Lieut. General Grant and ninety-nine others. The capital is to consist of \$1,000,000, made up of military fines, deduction from pay, and donations.

The Richmond papers say that it is reported the mission of Gen. Singleton and Mr. Hughes to Richmond, is "commercial," having reference to buying cotton, and selling beef and bacon, by authority. It is likely their visit is entirely on matters of private business.

The Inauguration Ball, in Washington, last night, is represented to have been largely attended, and as "brilliant in appearance" as any ever given on such an occasion. The President, Vice President, and many other dignitaries, were in attendance.
