GENERAL NEWS.

The Paymaster General has ordered Gen. Greenough's brigade of the Department of Western Virginia, now near Charlestown, Shenandoah Valley, to be paid off. This command has not received any pay since last April, and has now due several hundred thousand dollars.

At Deep Creek, Norfolk county, Virginia, Leroy G. Edwards has been appointed postmaster, vice W. White.

The contractors on the Chicago lake tunnel threaten to throw up the contract because they are loosing money every day.

The U. S. Supreme Court has decided a test case involving the condemnation of cotton seized on the Mississippi, on land, by the naval forces, declaring there could be no lawful prize of war in private property thus seized inland by the navy. This involves all the cotton seized on the Red river expedition, worth some two millions of dollars. As it is not prize of war, the proceeds thereof will go into the treasury, and only such owners as prove their loyalty will be entitled to reclamation.

Butter and eggs are declining in price, everywhere.

A cave nearly as large as the Mammoth cave of Kentucky, has recently been discovered about ten miles from Fort Ruby, California. It was found to be an immense subterranean lake of clear water, with high walls of limestone on either side. The ceiling or arch is fifty feet high.

Chief Justice Carter of the U. S. Court for the District of Columbia, has decided that the purchase and sale of gold for the sole purpose of trade, commerce or use, is a valid transaction, but that all transactions in gold for speculative purposes are illegal, invalid and against the public good.

At a meeting of the Freedman's Aid Society in Boston, on Thursday, the Rev. Mr. Hepworth made a speech. "He spoke of the retributions of the war and of a negro at Charleston, beneath whose sooty skin beat a heart as tender as a woman's, as courageous as a giant's and as unrevenged as an angel's. Mr. Hepworth proclaimed the Millennium in 1876, when every black man should stand on an equal platform with every white man."

The late affair in Queen Anne's county, Md., mentioned last Saturday, has caused the greatest excitement in that county. John P. Paca, has been arrested in Baltimore, charged with being concerned in the homicide.

The Washington Chronicle says: "Substitutes and their agents are now asking from eight hundred to 1,000 dollars in this city, and those principals who can afford to pay such prices have considerable difficulty in securing their men."
