WAR NEWS.

Information from City Point, dated Thursday 2 A. M., says, a heavy cannonading commenced at half past 10 o'clock, and was very furious until half past 1, in the direction of the Petersburg front, but no particulars were known at City Point when the mail-boat left there yesterday morning.

The Washington Chronicle of this morning, says that "we have a confirmation of the news of the advance. While the positions before Petersburg, at City Point, and on the north side of the James are held, a large force has crossed Hatcher's Run, and occupied, on Thursday night, a line parallel with and east of the Boydton plank road and west of Hatcher's Run. At the Boydton plank road the Confederate pickets were driven back, and a division advanced but a short distance further in the direction of the Southside railroad repulsed a division of the Confederates which charged upon them. Prisoners taken stated that the movement was a surprise. Rumors by the mail boat yesterday, are, that the Confederates were repulsed in three attempts on Wednesday night to break through the lines of the 9th corps in the vicinity of Fort Steadman."

A party of Confederates attacked the train on the Baltimore & Ohio R. R., which left that city on Thursday for Wheeling, at Green Spring, sixteen miles west of Cumberland, burnt and destroyed nearly all the cars, and carried off the money, watches, and valuables of the passengers.

Richmond papers of Wednesday report that Sheridan passed through Dinwiddie Court House on Wednesday morning, and they think his destination is the South Side Road.

The Richmond papers say that nothing has been heard from Johnston since the battle of Averysboro.

A dispatch from Newbern, N. C., dated March 28, says: "Sherman's forces are much in need of shoes, clothing and other necessities, and are now taking a brief repose. All is quiet at the front."

Theresa is a woman famous for singing "gaillard" songs in one of the low cafes chantants near the Boulevard Beaumarchais; songs of the kind to which Colonel Newcome took such honorable objection.
