NEWS BY TO-DAY'S MAIL.

Latest advices from the vicinity of Mobile are to the 1st of April. At that time Fort Bradley was closely invested on three sides, and the assault, it was thought, would take place in the course of a few days. In moving up to attack the Spanish fort, two Federal gunboats were destroyed by torpedoes. A portion of the crews escaped. The column under Gen. Steele had reached Pollard's. Almost all of the 6th Alabama cavalry are said to have been captured by Steele, together with two railway trains and large droves of cattle.

It is believed in Washington that the captors of the steamer Harriet Deford, after running her ashore in Indian Creek, stripped her of everything on board, and then burned her.

From Morehead City, N. C., we learn that Sherman has resumed his march northward, and has, in all probability, left Goldsboro' in his rear.

From Washington we learn that the eighth corps, heretofore guarding the line of the Upper Potomac, under General Hancock, has at length marched up the Shenandoah valley, for the purpose of co operating with Grant in the reduction of Lynchburg.

A notice is posted at the War Department that no passes to Richmond are granted under any circumstances. Nearly two hundred applications per day for passes to that city are refused at the department.

Petersburg was in command of General Warren until the 5th, when General Hartsuff was assigned the command, as military governor.

A correspondent contradicts the statement that the railroad to Richmond was nearly repaired. Not a working man has been put upon the Southside Railroad. It is to have its gauge changed, and take upon it rolling stock.

Baton Rouge advices of the 3d represent the river rising. The crevasse, six miles above Baton Rouge, on the west side, is one mile wide, quite deep, and is still widening. The country back is overflowed to the depth of sixteen feet.

A great demonstration by the colored people of New York is announced to take place on the 18th inst., in commemoration of the abolition of slavery.

The proceedings against Bishop Colenso, by the Bishop of Capetown have been pronounced void in law by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

The story of Capt. Maffitt, being now in prison at Havana, is now contradicted.

Vice President Johnson just missed being a passenger on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad train recently captured by guerrillas.
