NEWS BY TO-DAY'S MAIL.

The Chicago Times says:—"There must have been numberless police raids taking place in all the surrounding cities, such as those recently carried on here, which have driven all the thieves residing in the western States into Chicago. Such an immense number of pickpockets, burglars, garroters, highwaymen, and robbers in general, as are at present here could never be supposed to be indigenous to Chicago. There was an imposing array of them yesterday forenoon before Justice Miller, all of whom had evidently been exceedingly industrious on the previous day."

A gentleman from Georgia, says there is no one resource of the South so greatly underestimated as the amount of cotton still held there. He thinks there must be at least 1,500,000 bales in Georgia, and 1,000,000 bales more in Alabama. He has knowledge of hundreds of bales which have been buried in the sand for more than a year. He predicts that cotton will sell for 10 cts. per pound in Savannah as soon as the Government removes the restrictions upon its coming in.

The James river has been cleared sufficiently of obstructions to allow vessels to pass up to Richmond, and a regular line of mail steamers has been established between that place and City Point. The steamers Wilson Small and Metamora have been placed upon the route, each vessel making one trip per day so as to connect with the mail boats to and from Washington.

News by the Europa states that the U. S. Minister has demanded satisfaction of the Portuguese government for firing into the Niagara and Sacramento. He demands that the U. S. flag shall be saluted by the forts which fired into these vessels, and the dismissal of the Governor of the forts. The U. S. commanders deny any intention of sailing at the time they were fired upon.

The steamer Corsica, from Nassau on the 10th inst., reports that the blockade runner Banshee, with a thousand bales of cotton, arrived at Nassau on the 30th of March from Galveston. The Corsica reports Galveston garrisoned by 1,200 troops. Twelve Federal ships were off the bar. Six steamers had sailed recently from Havana for Galveston.

The columns of the St. Louis papers continue to supply evidence of the exodus of residents from the State of Missouri. The local papers have long lists of sheriff's sales of real estate. Good farms are selling in Sullivan County at from five to ten dollars per acre.

Hy. S. McPherson, of Georgetown, is on trial by military commission for serving in the Southern service, and assisting Miss Parton to go beyond the lines without a pass. The young lady is also to be tried for attempting to pass the lines without a pass.

The mayor of New York city has united with the governor of the state, to recommend the observance of Thursday next as a "day of thanksgiving to Almighty God for the bright prospect of returning peace and fraternal harmony."

It is understood that Gen. Grant's headquarters are to be permanently established in Washington.
