REWARD OF TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS.—The Washington Chronicle of yesterday contains the following notice—"To the People of Virginia—Alexandria, April 23. His Excellency, Francis H. Pierpont, Governor of Virginia, directs me to pay to any person or persons, two thousand dollars reward for the arrest of J. Wilkes Booth, or any one of his accomplices who shall be duly convicted of the assassination of President Lincoln, or the attempt on the life of Wm. H. Seward, Secretary of State; provided the parties shall be arrested within the confines of this State.

Arnold, George Wise, Wm. Young, G. W. Ramsay, S. C. Boush, all privates.

Pending the absence of Col. Welles, engaged in investigating the recent murder of President Lincoln, Capt. Winship, 2d D. C. Vols., will discharge the duties of Provost Marshal for this section.

President Johnson is said to be preparing a proclamation appointing a day of national mourning for President Lincoln. It will probably be the 25th day of May or the 1st of June.

A number of the former citizens of this place, including several ladies, have recently, with passes, returned to this place, from Richmond, Petersburg, and other places in Virginia. Several others, it is said, are to follow, this week.

It is said that the books of the Farmer's Bank of Virginia, and a portion of those of the Exchange Bank, were destroyed at the fire in Richmond.

The draw, in the stall of Mr. Thomas Javine, at the market house, was robbed of about \$20, on Saturday morning, while Mr. J. was absent for a moment. Three boys have been arrested and confined suspicion of committing the robbery.

The remains of President Lincoln reached Philadelphia on Saturday afternoon. An immense funeral procession was formed all along the route to Philadelphia, and in that city, every demonstration of respect was exhibited.

The reported changes in military command at Richmond, are contradicted. Gen. Halleck has gone there to attend, at present, to civil matters. Gen. Grant arrived at City Point yesterday, and proceeded to North Carolina.

The military authorities in Washington, have requested that notices of arrests and investigations with regard to the assassination of President Lincoln, and the attempted murder of Secretary Seward, be, for the present suppressed; and state that all information proper for publication, will be furnished by them.

The supply of fresh fish at the wharf is small. Shad are selling at \$18 per hundred, herring \$8 per thousand. Vegetables, in the market, are scarce and higher than they were a few days ago—but, this will change, no doubt, in a few days.

Advices from Newbern state that a large number of the members of the North Carolina Legislature arrived there on the 19th inst., for the purpose of negotiating with General Sherman with a view of restoring that State to the Union.

The important official documents which we publish to day, without condensation, comprise all the news which the newspapers contain of recent events.

Mrs Wilson Carrey, and her daughter Hetty, widow of the late Gen. Pegram have been released on parole in Baltimore.

Collector Draper, of New York, has issued an order to the health officer of the port, to carefully inspect all vessels arriving from ports in Europe, infected with the plague, and to report immediately, if any cases of the disease is discovered.

Mons. Alexandre Wolowski's grand vocal and instrumental concert will take place at Liberty Hall, this Monday evening, April 24, on which occasion he will be assisted by Mme. L. Gomez de Wolowska, the renowned prima donna, of the Italian Opera, Miss Mary E. Wheeler, and Miss Sardius P. Sanderson, vocalists of great reputation.
