NEWS BY TO-DAY'S MAIL.

A bulletin from Mr. Stanton says that Gens. Canby and Thomas were instructed, some days ago, that Sherman's arrangement with Johnston was disapproved by the President, and they were ordered to disregard it and push the enemy in every direction.

Dr. Valentine Mott, a distinguished surgeon, died in New York, on the 26th instant. He was one of the most eminent men of his profession in this country, and had a European reputation.

Herrold, captured when Booth was killed, is confined in Washington. He is said to be a dissipated, reckless young man.

It is estimated at the Treasury Department that the daily expenses of the government have been reduced nearly one million dollars per day since the surrender of Lee's army.—The clerical and other force of the Quartermaster's Department is to be immediately reduced fifty per cent.

The Charleston Courier reports the proceedings of a meeting held in that city on the 21st instant, to express sorrow for the death of Mr. Lincoln. The Hon. William Aiken, formerly Governor of the State, presided, and made an address.

The question is already mooted whether the parties engaged in the capture of Booth are entitled to the large reward, being in the service of the government. The general opinion is that the authorities will, in a spirit of liberality, pay over the reward or make a handsome distribution.

Over one hundred dwellings were robbed in Philadelphia on Saturday evening while the inmates were out viewing the funeral procession of the late President.

Rarey, the horse tamer, is again lecturing in Boston.

FROM RICHMOND.

On the 14th inst., Jefferson Davis started South from Greensboro', and Gov. Smith was also there, and had made a speech urging the people to join Gen. Johnston, but, it is said, no recruits offered. Gov. Smith had prevailed upon the authorities not to burn the bridges or property at Danville.

For the first time since the great fire the vaults of the Farmers' Bank of Virginia were opened on Tuesday, when all their contents, books, papers, Confederate money, and some few valuables belonging to private individuals, were found untouched.

Several of the gunboats and iron clads burned and blown up in the James river by the Confederate authorities, have been raised, and much of their armament found to be in a good condition.
