

A dispatch from Nashville on the 7th, published in the Northern papers says:—"The guerillas prevented the election in Hickman county on Saturday last, destroying the boxes and scattering the ballots. The band was under the leadership of a notorious fellow named Cowan. This is the only item of interruption occurring in General Rosecrans' district. All quiet at Chattanooga."

A vote was taken in New York yesterday on an amendment to the state constitution allowing the soldiers who are in the army to vote the same as other electors. The vote in the city passed off quietly. The total vote cast was 23,280, of which 16,401 were in favor of the amendment. The majority in favor of the amendment is 9,622.

It is distinctly denied that General Meade directed the army under him to retreat on the second of July at Gettysburg, as was recently stated by the New York Tribune. Brigadier General Gibbon denies it under his own signature. It was said that one of the Corps Commanders had the order in his pocket.

A dispatch from New York yesterday says: Gold advanced to 164 1/2 on the news of the defeat of Stebbins' gold bill.

Supervisor Booth, of Brooklyn, just returned from Washington, has officially informed the Board of Supervisors that a call for two hundred thousand more men would soon be made, and that the draft would soon be enforced.—He was so informed by Secretary Stanton.

A fire in Market street, St. Louis, on Monday, destroyed six dwelling houses and several shops. Loss twenty-two thousand dollars—about half insured.

An arrival at St. Louis from Mobile, February 18, reports that there were about eight thousand regular troops in the latter place.—Of the gunboats in Mobile bay at the time mentioned, four were iron clad, the Tennessee being the most formidable.
