

The Report of the U. S. Commissary General of Prisoners, accompanying Secretary Stanton's report, has just been published. It shows that the number of Confederate officers and men captured by us since the beginning of the war is: 1 lieutenant general, 5 major generals, 25 brigadier generals, 186 colonels, 146 lieutenant colonels, 244 majors, 2,497 captains, 5,811 lieutenants, 16,563 non-commissioned officers, 121,156 privates, and 5,800 citizens. Of these there were in the hands of the Federals at the date of the report 29,229 officers and men, among whom were 1 major general and 7 brigadiers. There had been 121,937 Confederates exchanged against 110,866 Federals. The exchanges of officers on both sides are computed at their exchangeable value in privates. Since the date of the above report there have been less than 1,000 exchanges, and a very few captures on either side.

A special detective of Gen. Winder in Richmond has been arrested and placed in Castle Thunder charged with furnishing Federal prisoners, on their way to City Point for exchange, with letters containing among other things "memoranda of all the orders issued from Gen. Winder's office during the late raid. The contents of the letters were deemed of sufficiently treasonable character to authorize his arrest."

The Knoxville Convention, we see by a telegram, has adjourned sine die, without accomplishing any result. They were satisfied, it is said, of "their inability to determine for themselves the grave questions affecting the welfare of the people of East Tennessee."

The Richmond Enquirer says that "at one time apprehensions were greatly felt for the supply of salt, but now there is believed to be more salt in the Confederacy than ever before at any one time."

A dispatch from Louisville reports a skirmish in Kentucky, in which twenty-five Confederates were killed and wounded, and fifty taken prisoners.

The hands of the Borden Mining Company, employed in unloading canal boats, at Georgetown, have struck for \$2 per day.
