

Markets in the South.

[From the Richmond Dispatch, April 8.]

The markets remain almost entirely unchanged. Many merchants continue to take the old currency at the rate of three for two, with the exception of fives, which are held on the same footing with the new currency. A few merchants offer slight inducements in favor of the new currency. The markets have not had sufficient opportunity as yet to recover from the retarding effects of the recent rains, which kept many articles of necessity away. It is confidently expected that in a few days things will be more plentiful and prices more inclined to fall.

Already, under the influence of the new currency, prices have taken rapid strides downward in several leading Southern States.—Corn is selling in Atlanta, for example, for seven dollars in the new currency; flour one hundred dollars; Irish potatoes, fourteen; sweet, fifteen; corn meal seven; molasses, fourteen to fifteen; rice, new, thirty five cents; old, twenty; bacon, two dollars and seventy-five cents; lard, the same; sugar, three and a half to four dollars.

We observe, also, that in Montgomery, Ala., bacon and lard have fallen to \$8.25 a pound, and in Mobile \$6 a bushel is the current price for corn, when a few days ago it was \$12, and fodder, which was \$20 and upward, sells now at \$5 per cwt.

On yesterday, we regret to say, the speculators exhibited a most cruelly avaricious disposition. At an auction sale sugar was run up to \$9 a pound, molasses to \$51, and several other necessary articles were advanced in similar proportion.

The Navy Register of the United States for the year 1864 has just been published at Washington, from which it appears that there are now in the U. S. Navy, six hundred and twenty-two vessels, four hundred and thirty-two of which are steamers, and seventy-four are iron-clads and rams. There are three hundred and forty-eight vessels in active service. Of these fifty-five are in the North Atlantic Blockading Squadron, sixty-seven in the South Atlantic Blockade, thirty-four in the East Gulf Blockade, sixty-two in the West Gulf Blockade, eighty-one in the Mississippi river and its tributaries, four in the special West India Squadron, eight in the Pacific, one in the Mediterranean, nineteen in the Potomac and seven on special service. The number of guns mounted on the different vessels is four thousand one hundred and eighty-four.

Financial affairs appear to be still in a feverish state in New York. The Times, in its money article of Wednesday evening, says: To-day there were damaging rumors in circulation of the continued weakness of some of the clearing-house banks, but these have not prevented the appearance on the Stock Exchange of stronger buyers than last week for many of the railway stocks, and the withdrawal of deposits at bank and with the United States Trust Company to pay for them. The market appeared quite firm and upward at the first board, on the adjournment of which, one or two additional failures, announced and rumored on the street, created a pause in the advance of prices.

Numbers of emigrants continuing to arrive in the U. S. becomes more and more a remarkable feature of the times. There arrived at New York last week 3,678, making the number since January 1st, 35,302, or over twice as many as arrived in the corresponding period of last year.

A fire at Lowell, Mass., yesterday destroyed several wood-work manufactories, involving a loss of about \$25,000.
