

FROM EUROPE.

NEW YORK, May 30.—The steamer City of Baltimore, from Queenstown on the 19th has arrived.

The steamer Samuel Martin has arrived at Liverpool, direct from Charleston, with cotton.

The Conference on the Schleswig-Holstein question held a three hours' session on the 17th instant. All the members were present.

The London Daily News says they can hardly be said to have advanced a single step, and that the prospect of an agreement is as distant as ever. No common basis of discussion has yet been decided upon. The conference adjourned till the 28th of May.

Messrs. Piet and Kelley, who were arrested in Baltimore, last week, and sent to Fort McHenry, have been permitted upon conditions that bond be given to sell no goods objectionable to the military authorities, to reopen their store. It is stated that there was no intention to suppress the issue of the Catholic Mirror newspaper, of which these gentlemen were the publishers, although last week's number was virtually suppressed by the closing of the printing office attached to the house. In the meantime, the two gentlemen remain in prison.

Hanover town is distant about ten miles from Hanover Court House, in a southeasterly direction and is on the west side of the Pamunkey above the White House, about fifteen miles by the country roads from Richmond.

Havana advices of the 25th mention the capture of Monte Christo, in St. Domingo, by the Spanish.

President Lincoln has recently pardoned twenty-seven of the Minnesota Indians who were concerned in the great massacre.

The sixty citizens of Fredericksburg, Va., arrested as hostages, have arrived at Fort Delaware.

The New York Army and Navy Gazette mentions a rumor that Gen. Butler has been removed from his command.

The fly is said to be seriously damaging the wheat crop in Kent county, Md.

In Chicago, the other day, twenty men were drafted who had been dead for some years.

A mob at Youngstown, Ohio, on the 25th, tarred and feathered two females.

**LATEST REPORTS.**

[From the Washington Star of this evening.]

MAY 30th—12 o'clock.—A dispatch from Gen. Grant, dated yesterday at Hanover town, has just been received by the War Department. It states that the army has been successfully crossed over the Pamunkey, and now occupies a front about three miles south of the river.

Yesterday two divisions of our cavalry had a severe engagement with the enemy, south of Harris's Store, driving him about a mile upon what appears to be his new line. We will find out all about it to day.

Our loss in the cavalry engagement was 350 killed and wounded, of whom but 44 are ascertained to have been killed.

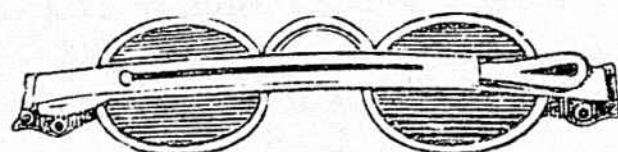
WASHINGTON, May 30th.—Major General Dix, New York: No official dispatches from the Army of the Potomac have been received since my telegrams of Saturday evening.

A telegram from Gen. Sherman dated near Dallas yesterday, the 29th at 7.30 a. m. reports that on Saturday an engagement took place between the enemy and McPherson's Corp., in which the rebels were driven back with a loss to them of 2,500 killed and wounded left in our hands, and about 300 prisoners. McPherson's loss being not over 300 in all.
