

LATEST REPORTS.
OFFICIAL DISPATCH.

WASHINGTON, June 4—10 P. M.—To Major Gen. Dix, New York: Dispatches from Gen. Grant's Headquarters, dated three o'clock yesterday afternoon have just been received. No operations took place on Thursday. Yesterday morning, at half past four o'clock Gen. Grant made an assault on the enemy's lines, of which he makes the following report:

"We assaulted at 4 30 a. m. this morning, driving the enemy within his entrenchments at all points, but without gaining any decisive advantage. Our troops now occupy a position close to the enemy—some places within fifty yards—and are remaining. Our loss was not severe, nor do I suppose the enemy to have lost heavily. We captured over three hundred prisoners, mostly from Breckinridge."

Another later official report (not from Gen. Grant) estimates the number of our killed and wounded at about three thousand. The following officers are among the killed: Colonel Haswell, of the 36th Wisconsin; Col. Porter, 8th New York Heavy Artillery; Col. Morris, 66th New York.

Among the wounded are General R. O. Tyler, seriously, will probably lose a foot; Col. McMahon, 164th New York; Col. Byrnes, 28th Massachusetts, probably mortally; Col. Brooks, 53d Pennsylvania.

The steamer Connecticut, which left the White House at 6 a. m. yesterday, arrived here this morning, bringing up eight hundred and seventy nine sick and wounded, including sixty two officers. These wounded are mostly of the cavalry corps. There were a number of Confederate wounded on board, among whom was Col. C. B. Christian, of the 49th Virginia cavalry, who was shot in the shoulder.

Terrific cannonading was heard during the entire day of Thursday at the White House, which continued until a late hour in the night, and was resumed again at daylight yesterday morning.

A bearer of dispatches from Gen. Grant to Secretary Stanton, who came in from the front to the White House reported that our forces attempted to cross the Chickahominy, but the passage was disputed by the Confederates when a desperate fight ensued. The Federal forces succeeded in driving the Confederates across the Chickahominy swamps, with considerable loss to them in killed, wounded, and prisoners.

Several of the Confederate wounded on the Connecticut says that Gen. Lee had been taken sick and gone back to Richmond, leaving the army under command of Gen. Ewell.

Eight hundred Confederate prisoners have already reached the White House.

A contraband camp, has been established at the White House, which already contains about 1 000 contrabands, and they continue to come in in droves.

Locomotives and cars have arrived on barges from Alexandria.
