FRIDAY EVENING, JUNE 10.

The Northern papers, this morning, contain no dispatch from Mr. Stanton. The agent of the New York Associated Press in his dispatch from the Headquarters of the Army of the Potomac, at 5 o'clock on the morning of the 8th reports that "a few shells were thrown on the left yesterday afternoon, but no damage. A portion of the 5th corps is reported as having arrived at a point on the Chickahominy, near Bottom's Bridge, and considerable cannonading was heard in that direction yesterday afternoon." Beyond this all is reported "quiet along the lines." An hour's truce was agreed upon between Gens. Lee and Grant, during which the wounded lying between the lines of the armies, were removed. None but medical officers and stretcher bearers were allowed to go on the field, and at the expiration of the hour "a voice from the Confederate lines sung out, "Boys, get to your holes, the time is up," when all hands left at once." General Meade has issued an order disgracing and sending out of the army a correspondent of the Philadelphia Inquirer, for having published in that journal of the 2d instant "a libellous statement on the Commanding General of this army calculated to impair the confidence of the army in the commanding officer." Lieut. Colonel Murphy had also been dismissed from the service for sending out a flag-of-truce without authority.

The Confederate Senate, June 3, passed the following resolution: "Resolved, That the President be requested to make an exposition, through our commissioners abroad, to the various European Powers, to which they may be accredited of the violations of the rules of civilized warfare, and of the atrocities committed by the Government and the armies of the United States in the prosecution of hostilities against the Confederate States of America."

The New York Journal of Commerce in its editorial comments on the Baltimore Convention says: "The Convention did the work laid out for it. * * * There was a man once who was so frequently chosen to office by the Legislature of Connecticut, that it is said the clerk of the House was accustomed to call the vote as follows: "Gentlemen will please step up to the clerk's desk and deposit their votes for Samuel Wyllis for Secretary of State. The Baltimore Convention was managed in much the same way. See particulars."

The Washington Star of yesterday evening contains the following announcement: "The Commissary General of Prisoners has directed that all officers and men (except guerrillas) now held as prisoners of war in the Old Capitol prison be immediately sent to the Fort Delaware. The guerrillas will be retained at the Old Capitol under strict guard."

It is said that Archibald Gracie, Jr., formerly a resident of Elizabeth, N. J., is now a general in the Confederate army, and that in the late battles south of Richmond, he opposed the 9th New Jersey, one company of which is from Elizabeth.

Albert W. Patrie has received a verdict of \$9,000, at the Green County, New York, Circuit Court, against U. S. Marshal Murray, and William Buckley, his deputy. Patrie was arrested in August, 1862, for alleged disloyal words, without process of law, and carried to New York, where he was confined in a cell with other prisoners for several days.

Enrolling officers from Cape Girardeau, Mo., en route for New Madrid, with a detachment of twelve men, when within eight miles of New Madrid, were attacked by about seventy guerrillas. The enrolling officer was instantly killed, and the Sergeant of the First Missouri was dangerously wounded.

A Federal deserter, jumped from the third story window of Green's Cabinet factory, (now used as a prison for deserters,) last night, and was so much injured that he had to be taken to a hospital on a stretcher. It is said he was trying to make his escape. It is reported that he died this morning.

It is said that measures are about to be taken to put a stop to the equestrian exercises at the Southern end of Water street, which have been conducted by males and females, for the last month or two, to the danger of life and limb of innocent pedestrians.

A correspondent of one of the Northern papers from the Army of the Potomac, reports that the Richmond Examiner of the 3d, contains an account of the wounding and death of Col. Lawrence M. Keitt, of South Carolina.

A Rio Janeiro letter, of April 22, says the United States steamer Sacramento left on the 5th ultimo for the Cape of Good Hope, in search of the Alabama.

The places of the coal heavers in Georgetown, who "struck," the other day, were supplied by "contrabands," at low wages. The "strikers" offered to go to work again, but were peremptorily ordered off by the coal agents.

There is a Democratic Association in Washington which is taking an active part in the Presidential canvass in opposition to Mr. Lincoln.

Benj. R. Grymes, of King George County, Va., has been captured by the Federals and sent to Fort Delaware.

The "go by" given to Vice President Hamlin, in the Baltimore Convention, is variously commented on, in the Northern papers.

The beef speculators, in New York, have "got a black eye," this week. Numbers of cattle had to be left over "unsold."

Gold closed firm and active in New York, yesterday, at 198½.

The Resolution, 93 tons, sailed from the Clyde for Nassau on the 25th ult. During the fortnight preceding May 26, three new paddle steamers, had sailed from the Clyde for Nassau. Five others were fitting out and about a dozen were building for blockade running.

The Washington Star publishes an account of an attack upon a fish boat, near the shore, opposite Occoquan, by guerrillas, on Wednesday, in which it is stated that one of the guerrillas was killed, one taken prisoner, and two made their escape, &c., &c.

FROM RICHMOND.

The Philadelphia Inquirer contains the following:

The following news was taken from the Richmond Examiner of the 7th inst.:-

A bill had passed Congress increasing the pay of non-commissioned officers and privates seven dollars per month for the term of one year. A bill to exempt Quakers from engaging in the fight or bearing arms, was also passed.

Last night the enemy abandoned our left and part of our centre, apparently in great haste. The prisoners captured say that Grant has gone to the White House, on account of his army refusing to fight elsewhere. The impression is that Grant is making his way toward the James River, to gain the south side of that stream."

Lawrence M. Keitt, was killed at the battle of Cold Harbor.

FROM KENTUCKY.

CINCINNATI, June 9.—The Confederates are now at Falmouth, on the Kentucky Central Railroad, and at Williamstown on the turnpike, thirty miles from Cincinnati.

A large Confederate force is reported twelve miles east of Lexington, and another approaching from Richmond.

The Confederates are also reported between Crab Orchard and Stamford. They burned a large warehouse and water station at Cynthiana yesterday, and now have possession of Paris, Cynthiana, Georgetown and Williamstown.

LOUISVILLE, June 9.—About seven hundred Confederate cavalry, supposed to be part of Gen. Morgan's force entered Paris, Kentucky, last night, without resistance.
