

On Thursday a Committee of the Baltimore Republican Convention, waited on Mr. Lincoln, to inform him, officially, of his nomination by that body, for President of the United States, and to present him with a copy of the "platform," adopted by the Convention. The following is Mr. Lincoln's reply:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Committee, I will neither conceal my gratification nor restrain the expression of my gratitude, that the Union people through their Convention in the continued effort to save and advance the Nation, have deemed me not unworthy to remain in my present position.

I know no reason to doubt that I shall accept the nomination tendered; and yet, perhaps, I should not declare definitely before reading and considering what is called the platform.

I will say now, however, I approve the declaration in favor of so amending the Constitution as to prohibit slavery throughout the nation. When the people in revolt, with a hundred days of explicit notice that they could within those days resume their allegiance without the overthrow of their institutions, and that they could not resume it afterward elected to stand out, such amendment to the Constitution as is now proposed became a fitting and necessary conclusion to the final success of the Union cause. Such alone can meet and cover all cavils. Now, the union of the North and South, perceive its importance, and embrace it. In the names of Liberty and Union let us labor to give it legal form and practical effect.

During the afternoon a delegation of the "National Union League" paid their respects to Mr. Lincoln. O. T. Beard, on behalf of the delegation, made a few remarks, to which Mr. Lincoln replied and in the course of his remarks, (as reported in the Washington Star,) said:

"I do not allow myself to suppose that either the convention or the League have concluded to decide that I am either the greatest or best man in America, but rather they have concluded that it is not best to swap horses while crossing the river, and have further concluded that I am not so poor a horse that they might not make a botch of it in trying to swap."—[Laughter and applause.]

Ninety-two prisoner, among whom were Major Oliver S. Sanford, 7th Connecticut, two captains, a lieutenant, and a surgeon, arrived in Richmond on the 24th inst.
