

Memphis advices of the 13th contain further accounts of the defeat of Gen. Sturgis.—The troops comprising his command were two brigades of cavalry under Grierson, two brigades of infantry, First Illinois Light Artillery and two regiments of negro infantry, all under the command of Gen. Sturgis. Forrest is said to have started his entire command for Georgia, but recalled them upon learning of the advance of the Federal forces. Out of eighteen guns, four only were brought off. Almost one hundred wagons were taken, and the greater portion of the Federal wounded fell into the hands of the Confederates whose cavalry pursued the Federal forces to Colliersville.

The manufacturers of goods for the American markets in France, are much concerned at the movements in the North, against the use of foreign goods.

Gen. McClellan delivered, the oration yesterday at the dedication of the site of the battle monument erected at West Point.

A beautifully illuminated baloon passed over the Northern portion of the town last night, and attracted much notice. The ascension was a very successful one.

The firing of the "big gun" at Battery Rodgers to-morrow morning, at ten o'clock, will attract a crowd. A target placed in the river is to be fired at.

The price of wool at the north is now, generally, \$1 per lb. Gold, yesterday, 198. Cotton increasing in price.

Chas. A. Binney, a merchant in New York, has been arrested for being concerned in blockade running.

The "Life of Stonewall Jackson" is a prohibited article at Louisville—so General Burbridge notifies the booksellers of that city.

POSTSCRIPT!

FROM THE ARMY OF THE POTOMAC.

[Correspondence of the Philadelphia Inquirer.]

JONES' BRIDGE, Va., Monday Morning, June 13.—By the left flank once more the Federal army has been crossing here quietly for some hours.

A portion of the Eighteen Corps and some other troops were first withdrawn and moved to the rear. During the night the rest were quietly withdrawn. The headquarters' trains left Cold Harbor on Sunday at three A. M., and we are now encamped here. Our next march is to bring us to James River. White Oak Swamp now protects the right wing, and the Chickabominy in a few hours will cover the rear.

The Richmond Dispatch of Saturday, June 11th mentions a rumor brought into the city, of Wade Hampton having had a sharp fight with Sheridan's cavalry west of Richmond, where the Yankees were endeavoring to reach the canal locks on James river, and claims that the Confederates had obtained some success.

The Inquirer, editorially, says: "Undoubtedly, General Grant does not mean to waste time behind Butler's intrenchments. The Rebels have the interior and shorter line, and may meet him on the south side of Richmond as soon as he reaches that vicinity."
