As there are no enclosures around several of the cemeteries, it is to be expected that cattle will enter the grounds, of their own accord, in search of food. **THE COAL TRADE**—The citizens of Charlestown, Massachusetts, have clubbed together to procure their supplies for next winter from the Nova Scotia mines, where coal is delivered at nine dollars a ton. Companies of consumers in Philadelphia, equally have agreed to buy cargoes on their own account, thereby saving a considerable percentage. In connection with this subject we find the following paragraph in a Boston paper: "We understand that a coal association in Chelsea proposes to supply its members with Pennsylvania coal three dollars a ton cheaper than the dealers ask for it." The same paper proposes the use of peat as a substitute for coal.

The new internal revenue tax bill has passed both houses of the U. S. Congress. The income tax is so arranged that all incomes above \$600 and under \$5,000 are taxed five per cent.; above \$5,000 and not exceeding \$10,000, seven and a half per cent., and over \$10,000, ten per cent. The bank tax is one per cent. on average circulation, and one-half per cent. on deposits and capital. On whiskey, one dollar and fifty cents after July 1st ensuing, and two dollars after the 1st of February next; on beer one dollar per barrel.

In reply to some strictures on President Lincoln, for the release of Col. Fish, the late Provost Marshal in Baltimore, the American of that city, says, "Col. Fish was sentenced by the Court Martial to pay a fine of five thousand dollars and to be imprisoned until the fine was paid. He failed to pay the fine, and the War department designated the New York Penitentiary as the place of his confinement. Latterly the fine has been paid—the money, it is currently reported, having been furnished by a disreputable party in this city, and Fish has been liberated."
