

LATEST FROM GEORGIA.

The Washington Chronicle of this morning officially announces that "there is no doubt that General Sherman has crossed the Chattohoochee, on his advance toward Atlanta, and we believe the statement to be correct that he is tearing up the railroads to prevent the enemy from making use of them. The crossing was not opposed by formidable numbers, but by a comparatively few cavalry."

GOLD.

NEW YORK, July 20.—Gold, to-day, 262.

Gen. Burbridge has issued an order of retaliation upon guerrillas for cruelties said to be perpetrated upon the citizens of Kentucky. "For every union man killed, he orders the instant execution, as near the scene of the outrage as possible, of four guerillas, to be selected from the prisoners in the hands of the military authorities."

The Provost Marshal at Memphis has arrested and imprisoned four of the most prominent, wealthy and respectable citizens of that city, "for affecting loyalty and vouching for Rebel emissaries, thus doing much mischief to the Union cause."

Several prominent Confederate sympathizers residing at Bladensburg and in its vicinity were arrested and sent to the Old Capitol by the military authorities for fraternizing with and giving information to the invaders.

Charles B. Waites, a clerk employed in the foreign department of the post office of New York, was arrested, on Saturday, charged with robbing from the mails \$8,850 in United States coupon bonds. The prisoner confessed his guilt.

A despatch from Fortress Monroe states the Federal prisoners as soon as captured are now removed to Georgia, most of the enlisted men to Andersonville and the officers to Macon.

The Federal steamers which were sent in search of the Florida, are returning, and report no trace of her in the latitudes through which they were ordered to cruise.

Rev. Thomas Druman, who, for some months has preached in Christ Church, has been appointed a chaplain to one of the hospitals here.

The order calling for the services of the militia and volunteers for the District of Columbia has been rescinded, and they are accordingly mustered out.

Walter Hellen, son of Johnson Hellen, a citizen of Washington, was yesterday arrested and sent to the Old Capitol upon a charge of "disloyalty."

Grant is said to have built an immense wharf, half a mile long, at City Point.

The Confederate loan, under the Sciota's news, advanced, in London, to 69@70.

The weather this morning was very sultry. The Danish Ministry has resigned.

HEADQUARTERS MILITARY GOVERNOR, ALEXANDRIA, Va., July 18, 1864.

I. The office of Provost Marshal of Alexandria is abolished.

II. The Provost Marshal General D. S. P. Lient. Col. H. H. Wells, has had turned over to him and has consented to take jurisdiction of the following subjects. Viz:

Prisons and Prisoners.
Grand, River, Prison, and other Provost Guards.

Deserters, Stragglers, and Smugglers.
Passes, (except to officers and men of this command.)

III. These headquarters retain the control of the subjects of

Contrabands.
Sanitary condition of the city.
Liquor permits.
Military Police and Patrols.
Order of the City.
Civil duties of Military Governor.
Command of troops for defence.

IV. A Military Court is established at No. 7 North Fairfax Street, connected with these Headquarters, with office hours as follows: from 9 to 11 o'clock A. M. and 4 to 5 o'clock P. M.

V. Current orders upon the subject of the unauthorized disposition of liquors will be enforced as heretofore through these Headquarters.

VI. Captain William M. Gwynne, A. A. D. C. will have charge of the Military Court.—His decision (with the testimony taken) will be received and approved, changed, or disapproved at these Headquarters. He will also issue Liquor Permits.
