

FROM GEORGIA.

Gen. Sherman reports to the War Department at Washington that the Confederates assaulted his line three times on Wednesday last, each time meeting with a repulse, with little loss to the party attacked, as they were mostly behind earthworks."

ATLANTA, GA., July 16.—Rumors of another attempt by the enemy to cut the West Point railroad are in circulation, but nothing certain of the movement is yet known.

The following official report was sent by command of General Johnston to headquarter last night:

HEADQUARTERS IN THE FIELD.

Since the failure of the enemy to cut the West Point railroad, near Newman, both armies have been quiet and occupy their former position. Ours is much improved by rest and bathing, and all are in fine spirits.

The Richmond Enquirer notices a rumor that Gen. Kirby Smith has crossed the Mississippi and reached the rear of Gen. Sherman's army.

Among the orders of Gen. Ransom issued to the Confederates during their recent raid into Maryland, and published by the Wheeling Intelligencer, we find these:

"The following act of Congress approved June 1, 1864, is published for the information of this command:

"The Congress of the Confederate States of America do enact that the commanding General of any army in the field shall have the power to direct the dismounting of any non-commissioned officer or officers, soldier or soldiers in the cavalry service in his command, and to place him or them in the infantry, who shall misbehave before the enemy or shall be guilty of wasting, spoiling, or appropriating to his use any private property or doing any violence to any citizen."

"Destruction of the fences and crops of the farmers is positively prohibited, and such outages will be paid for from the pay of the officers of the command nearest where such depredations may be committed."

There is a strong disposition in Wall street to renew speculation on railroad and miscellaneous stocks; but for once speculators are prudent, and think the financial situation dictates patience. The price of gold has advanced nearly one hundred since the panic of April, and during the same time stocks have declined on an average of about twenty five per cent., whilst the earnings of the roads have been largely increasing. This, it is thought, lays a basis for a vigorous movement for a rise when the money market favors.

An order was issued yesterday at the War Department in Washington by Secretary Stanton forbidding all persons employed in the several bureaus from communicating any information whatever respecting the business of the Department to any person not on duty in one of the offices without the written or verbal authority of the Secretary.

Major Gen. Dix arrived at Washington on Tuesday morning, and, after a long interview with President Lincoln and Secretary Stanton, left in the evening. His mission, it is said, was mainly in connection with the enforcement of the draft in New York, under the last call for 500,000 men.

The Washington correspondent of the New York Tribune says that there are now about one hundred and forty thousand sick and wounded Federal soldiers in the military and camp hospitals.

The repair shop of the Cleveland and Pittsburg Railroad Company at has been destroyed by fire. Loss \$30,000.

The Baltimore and Ohio railroad is repaired and is now said to be in complete running order to all points west.

- Grand, River, Prison, and other Provost Guards.

Deserters, Stragglers, and Smugglers. Passes, (except to officers and men of this command.)

III. These headquarters retain the control of the subjects of

- Contrabands.
- Sanitary condition of the city.
- Liquor permits.
- Military Police and Patrols.
- Order of the City.
- Civil duties of Military Governor.
- Command of troops for defence.

IV. A Military Court is established at No. 7 North Fairfax Street, connected with these Headquarters, with office hours as follows: from 9 to 11 o'clock A. M. and 4 to 5 o'clock P. M.

V. Current orders upon the subject of the authorized disposition of liquors will be enforced as heretofore through these Headquarters.

VI. Captain William M. Gwynne, A. A. D. C. will have charge of the Military Court.—His decision (with the testimony taken) will be received and approved, changed, or disapproved at these Headquarters. He will also issue Liquor Permits.
