

**LATEST FROM EUROPE.**

By the *Hibernia* and *America* we have European advices to the 26th ult.

In the British H. of Lords, Earl Russell, and in the House of Commons Sir George Gregon, on behalf of Lord Palmerston, gave notice that they would on the first of May, move an address to the Queen expressing horror and indignation at the assassination of President Lincoln, and praying her to convey that expression of feeling to the American Government.

Two great meetings were held in Liverpool, which adopted unanimously resolutions expressing horror and deep sorrow at the assassination. Resolutions of a similar nature were adopted at meetings in London and other places.

The Americans in London assembled on the invitation of F. Wool. The meeting adjourned to the 1st of May, when Minister Adams will preside at a mass meeting of Americans.

The Italian Chamber of Deputies has adopted an address expressing grief at President Lincoln's assassination, and the chamber was draped in mourning in his honor.

Paris letters state that the most profound and universal regret and indignation was expressed there at the assassination.

The London Times says: "The end has come at last, and the great American war is virtually closed by Lee's surrender of the Virginia army. The tone of the correspondence between Grant and Lee is honorable to both. The conditions were such that it was no disgrace for an overmatched army to accept. Not even Napoleon's grand army count a series of more brilliant victories than the Army of Virginia. They were victorious until victory was no longer to be achieved by human valor, and they fell with honor. Two years ago Gen. Lee might have escaped to Lynchburg, but now the Federal generals move with as great rapidity, and attack as Napoleon's marshals. The Federal army is entitled to a rank among the very first in military nations. All attempts to establish a Southern Confederacy must be abandoned."

The Times of Tuesday says: "With the defeat of the Southerners the greatest difficulties of the Federal Government set in. Much lies between the conquest of the South and the restoration of the Union, in the face of political problems of unexampled difficulty to be confronted. Such questions as the regeneration of the currency, reform of the tariff, management of the national debt, important as they are in themselves, may appear insignificant."

Notwithstanding the strong sympathy they feel for the South in Liverpool, the intelligence of Lee's surrender was received with great satisfaction, causing increased confidence in commercial circles.

Count Walewski has been appointed president of the Corps Legislatif, in France.

The Mexican embassy will be officially received by the Pope shortly. The American ambassador has been received by the Emperor and Empress.

The secretary of the Russian Legation was assassinated in Paris by a Russian.

The Czarowitz died at Nice on Sunday.—The Czar, Princess Dagmar, and the Queen of Denmark, were with him.

A meeting was held at Brussels, followed by a great demonstration, in honor of the Federal victories.

Juan Boyle and R. E. Cleary, formerly of Washington, who were in the Southern army, and have returned to Washington, were sent South, on Saturday, they having refused to take the oath of allegiance.
