Mr. Chamberlain, of Illinois, highly recommended by Gov. Yates, of Illinois, and by the Supreme Court of Illinois, for the district attorneyship of Montana Territory, came to Washington to secure his appointment; but after waiting a few days, seeing how beset the President was, enveloped his recommendations in this note:

JUNE 2, 1865

To Andrew Johnson, President United States:

SIR: I thought of asking an office from you; but seeing the crowd boring you for that purpose, I'll be damned if I'll do it.

The President saw the papers and at once endorsed upon them his appointment.

The provision made by Congress for continuing the work on the Census having failed to become a law, and the former appropriation being exhausted, the Secretary of the Interior has directed the records of that office and its unfinished work to be placed in charge of the Commissioner of the Public Land Office.

The steamer Weybossett brings Savannah dates to the 31st. The N. Y. Herald says a public meeting was held on the night of the 13th, at which resolutions were adopted, endorsing President Johnson's policy, namely: that sympathizers with secession are not to be supported for office, and asking a military Governor for Georgia.

An outrage is reported as having been committed near Bladensburg, last week, by three drunken officers, involving the death of the victim, a young lady, near that town. The offenders were captured and tried before a drum head court-martial, and sentenced to be hung.

The government has decided to retain the provost marshals in all the States except Rhode Island, and the present officers will hold their places in every Congressional district. The same system will be extended to the Southern States, and officers of the government apprehend that it will be a year before it can be relinquished.

The steamer Helvetia, from Liverpool and Queenstown, arrived last week with twelve hundred and seventeen immigrants on board. The Helvetia has the credit of bringing the largest cargo of human beings that ever crossed the Atlantic in a single steamer.

Forty eight members of company C, Nelson Virginia Artillery, and six members of company A, of the same battalion, now prisoners at Fort Delaware, have appealed to Governor Peirpoint to use his influence in procuring their release.

A report has reached Richmond that Rev. Edward J. Willis was recently murdered in Fauquier Co.

It is said that Gen. Longstreet is to apply for a special exception under the late amnesty proclamation.

Colonel Sanderson, author of the Florida secession ordinance, has come into Jacksonville to pay his taxes; also, Hon. D. L. Yulee, Colonel McCormick, and others. They are ready to take the oath of allegiance.
