

LOCAL NEWS.

COUNTY COURT.—June Term—Monday.—W. W. White was appointed Presiding Justice, pro tem., in the absence of H. S. Wunder.

Wm. H. McKnight was exonerated from the payment of an erroneous assessment of \$5.15.

Carson vs. Carson's heirs—in chancery—complainant's application filed and her bill for dower referred to J. A. Stoutenburg, commissioner, for assignment thereof out of real estate of Geo. Carson.

An account of Mr. Demaine for \$6 was allowed.

Geo. O. Wunder was exempted from the payment of taxes for 1861 '2 and '3.

The laying of the county levy was postponed until the next term of the Court, at which time all the justices are summoned to appear.

Accounts of Mr. Bushby, jailor, for \$116.45 were allowed.

Accounts of S. N. Garwood, Adm. of Jas. English, Geo. C. Hewes, adm. of Emma Vane, and Thos. McCormick, adm. of Elias Harrison, were ordered to lie over for one month.

We are requested to state that "in many cases the garbage carts, do not call for the slops at different houses, oftener than once a week—at many houses in the lower part of the town they never call at all. At some houses in the Corporation a garbage cart has never made its appearance. Thus the whole object of the law establishing these carts is defeated."

There was some disturbance made in the upper part of the city late last night, by persons apparently intoxicated, tearing off the railing from porches, beating at doors and windows, &c. If detected the persons engaged in these proceedings will be dealt with according to law.

The grounds and dwelling of Thomas Green, Esq., of Washington, who was unconditionally released from the Old Capitol after several weeks imprisonment, were despoiled of many valuables, notwithstanding a military guard was assigned to the place.

The municipal election took place in Washington yesterday. There was very little interest in the election, and but a small vote cast. S. E. Douglass was elected Register; Wm. Dixon, Collector; and Wm. Forsyth, Surveyor.

Strawberries were selling in market this morning at 30 cts. per quart; cherries 20 to 25 cts. per quart; green peas 60 to 75 cts. per peck; butter 50 cts. per lb.; eggs 30 cts. per dozen.

A Dr. Wooster, in Washington, has been arrested, charged with causing the death of a married woman, in Georgetown, by procuring abortion.

The breach in the C. & O. Canal has been repaired, and the water let into the Canal. The boats are beginning to arrive at Georgetown.

MARRIAGE LICENSES.—Since the last term of the County Court, twenty-five marriage licenses have been issued from the Clerk's office.

Yesterday, in the County Court, Walter L. Pean, formerly a member of the Court, but who has been absent in the military service of the U. S., made application for his seat as one of the Justices, which had been filled by the election of another person during his absence. The Court postponed the subject to the next term, Mr. P. protesting against the postponement.

DEEDS.—Since the last term of the County Court thirty-two conveyances have been entered on the records.

Dr. Wunder, of Alexandria County, whose death was reported and published a few days ago, is not dead.

There is a great change in the temperature since yesterday. This morning was cloudy and cool.

The Sixth Army corps is to be reviewed in Washington on Thursday next.

The Sun Fire Company, and their guests, made an excursion to-day to Glymont.

THE CONSPIRACY TRIALS—Evidence was introduced yesterday to show that J. C. Z. Jenkins, brother of Mrs. Surratt, was a disloyal person, and that Dr. Mudd had visited Washington between the 1st and 4th of March; which was replied to by the defence with rebutting testimony. A singular letter in cipher, picked up by a Mr. Duell, at Morehead city, N. C., showing the existence of a conspiracy to assassinate prominent officials, was introduced in court, and Mr. Duell testified to the facts concerning its discovery. A large amount of the suppressed evidence, referred to yesterday, has been published. Judge Advocate Holt animadverted upon the impropriety of this premature publication.

NOTICE.—The attention of our citizens is called to the following laws in relation to the Policing of the city:

AN ACT for the removal and prevention of obstructions in King Street.

"SEC. 1. Be it enacted by the City Council of Alexandria, That all awning posts, sign posts, projecting signs and all other similar projections and erections, whatsoever, over and upon King st., shall be taken down and removed within twenty days after the passage of this act. And if the same be not taken down and removed within said time, it shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Police to cause the same to be taken down and removed at the expense of the owners, or occupants of the premises. Any person who shall hereafter put up any such posts, signs or other obstructions, or in any way obstruct the sidewalks shall forfeit and pay to the corporation a fine of five dollars, and a further fine of one dollar for each and every day the same shall be continued, with costs to be recovered as other fines imposed by the laws of the City Council."

"SEC. 6. That no distiller, soap boiler, tallow chandler, hatter, or other persons, shall discharge, cast, or cause to flow into any of the streets, lanes or alleys, or other parts of the town, or keep in his or her house, cellar or contiguous grounds, any foul or nauseous liquids, filth or putrescent substance. Every person offending therein, shall, for each offence, forfeit and pay five dollars, besides the expense of removal.

"SEC. 7. That no person shall receive or retain in his or her store, warehouse, cellar, yard, or other place, any fish, beef, pork or other animal or vegetable substance, after the same shall have become putrid or damaged, so as to emit an offensive smell, dangerous to the health of the inhabitants, under the penalty of five dollars every day the same shall continue after reasonable notice in writing given by the superintendent of police for its removal; nor shall any auctioneer, vendue master, or other person, sell, or offer or expose for sale, any such putrid or damaged articles, knowing them to be so damaged, under the penalty of ten dollars for every such sale or exposure for sale.

"SEC. 8. That it shall be the duty of every person on whose property there may be any sunken place, containing stagnant water, or other nuisance, to fill up or drain the same, or to remove such nuisance. When the property on such sunken place, containing stagnant water or other nuisance, belongs to a person residing out of the corporation, the occupier shall remove the same, and when it is not occasioned by him, her, or them, he, she, or they, may deduct the expense of removal from any rents which may be then due, or thereafter become due. Any person who shall neglect to drain, or fill up such sunken place, or remove such nuisance as aforesaid within three days after the expiration of the time limited by order of Council for that purpose, shall forfeit and pay a fine not exceeding twenty dollars for such neglect, and the superintendent of police shall immediately proceed to fill or drain, or otherwise remove the same at the expense of the corporation."

The enforcement of the above laws devolving upon me, as superintendent of police, I hereby give notice that I will cause all persons found violating them after this date to be promptly arrested, and the penalty of the law inflicted—and I call upon the Police Constables to aid in enforcing these laws.
