NEWS BY TO-DAY'S MAIL.

At a meeting at Faneuil Hall, Boston, resolutions were adopted declaring "that the work of reorganizing the Government and society in the rebel States requires of the legislative and executive departments of the Government the most deliberate exercise of their powers of statesmanship, and declaring also that it is essential, for the liberty of the Government, that none be allowed to vote who are not loyal, and that none should be excluded from voting because of race or color."

William T. Ingle, who was convicted of being a spy by a military commission convened in Baltimore last summer, and sentenced to be hung, but subsequently had his sentence commuted to imprisonment for life, and more recently pardoned on taking the oath, was rearrested yesterday on the charge of disloyalty, and committed to prison to answer.

Gen. Wilson telegraphs that he has issued to the poor in Atlanta, Ga., during the last seven days, over one hundred thousand pounds of meat and flour. He represents that the people in ten counties adjacent to Atlanta are in a starving condition, and says relief in the shape of corn and meat must be extended to thirty thousand people at the very least with such efficiency as to save life. Gen. Thomas has ordered five thousand bushels of corn to be distributed for the relief of the indigent people of the northern counties of Georgia.

Late information (one sided) from Mexico, says the Empire is waning fast. The Emperor Maximilian is a mere puppet in the hands of Marshal Bazaine. The Empress displays more firmness and decision of character than her husband, and exerts great control over him. She is really Empress of Mexico. The foreign and Mexican troops are bordering on disorganization. The French are only reliable, and look to Bazaine for orders. The Mexicans will rebel at the first opportunity.

The different parish organizations of Louisiana express about the following sentiments:—The strife has closed, and the revolution has failed. There must be no attempt or renewal of opposition to the United States—that all must accept the era in good faith, and stand by the Government.

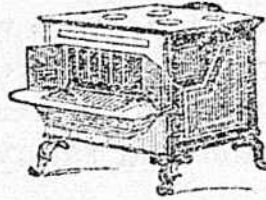
The important work of filling Cairo to high water grade commenced on Monday. This is an immense work, and it is supposed will occupy two years.
