Some important changes are about to take place in the military departments north of the Potomac. According to the Washington correspondent of the New York Times, as soon as the mustering out of the Army of the Potomac is completed, one division of each army corps alone remaining in service, new military departments are to be organized. Of these several divisions, one is to be commanded by Major General Wright, with his headquarters at Martinsburg; another by Brevet Major General Mott; a third by Brevet Major General Ayres, and a fourth by Brevet Major General Getty. The middle military division, now commanded by Major General Wallace, is to be abolished, and the States of Maryland, Pennsylvania, Delaware and West Virginia, are to be constituted a new department, which is to be commanded by Major General Hancock, whose headquarters will be established in Baltimore. Major General Dix is to be succeeded, in command of the department of the east, by Major General Hooker.

Large numbers of men formerly belonging to the Confederate army are said to be crossing the Rio Grande into Mexico. It is again reported that Dr. Gwin only waits the sanction of Maximilian to proceed at once to Sonora as Director General of Emigration. We are now told that ten thousand Confederates are to be enlisted in the service of the Emperor, and will occupy several States as a protection to the emigrants. Capt. Page and the officers of the Stonewall are said to have gone to Mexico to offer their services to the Imperial Government, and also to negotiate for the sale of the Stonewall. The French Admiral is represented as advocating the purchase, and as declaring that with the ram he could defend the Mexican coast against the whole American navy.

The New York Times, mistaking government credit for commerce, is jubilant over the tide of commercial prosperity, but the figures do not show it. It is aptly remarked, that some men are disposed to think that because they are rich, nobody is poor, or because money is plenty trade is prosperous.

A stockholder in the U. S. Telegraph Company has written a letter to the New York Tribune in which he brings very serious charges against the Directors of the Company in relation to the proposed extension of the line to the Pacific.

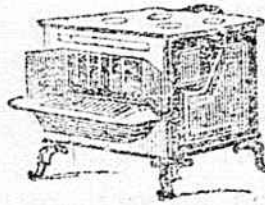
The notorious Col. Jennison, of Jayhawker memory, in the West, has been tried by a court martial, and "dishonorably dismissed from the U. S. service."
