

C. & O. CANAL.—The breaches on the C. & O. Canal have been repaired, and the Cumberland Coal trade re-opened. Fourteen thousand tons of coal have been received in Georgetown since Sunday last. Business it is expected will be active.

The scarcity of Cameron Water, at present existing is occasioning some inconvenience, and there are complaints concerning it. At the recent fires the absence of a full supply of water was seriously felt.

Tomatoes were selling in market this morning at 35@40 cts. per quarter of a peck; cucumbers 25 cts. per dozen; new potatoes 30 cts. per half peck. Green corn, (small ears) has made its appearance.

TRIAL OF THE CONSPIRATORS.

FINDINGS OF THE MILITARY COMMISSION.

THEY ARE DECLARED GUILTY.

Mrs. Surratt, David E. Herrold, Lewis Payne and Geo. A. Atzerodt, TO BE HANGED TO-MORROW!

The Other Conspirators to be Imprisoned in the Albany Penitentiary.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—An order was issued this morning from the War Department, dated yesterday, by which it appears that,

The President of the U. S. has approved of the findings and sentences of the Military Commission in the cases of David E. Herrold, Mrs. Surratt, Geo. A. Atzerodt and Lewis Payne, and therefore they are to be hung.—The time fixed is to morrow between the hours of 10 a. m., and 2 p. m., under the direction of the military authorities, the order being addressed to Major Gen. Hancock.

Dr. Mudd, Arnold and O'Laughlin are to be imprisoned at hard labor for life, and Spangler for six years in the Albany penitentiary.
