ROBERT AMORY IS ALIVE

Reported Death of the Man Shot at Grafton Was Erroneous.

MEN ARE COUSINS, NOT BROTHERS

LeRoy Amory Was Admitted to Bail in the Sum of \$2,500 by Bail Commissioner Stores Yesterday—Wounded Man is in Serious Condition.

Robert Amory, who was shot and dangerously wounded by LeRoy Amory at Grafton, York county, Tuesday morning, is still alive and not dead as the reports received from the scene of the shooting had it Tuesday night. He was said to be resting easier yesterday afternoon and though the physicians have little hope for his recovery, the members of his family have not given up all hope.

LeRoy Amory, who fired the shot, was admitted to bail in the sum of \$2,500 by Captain William J. Stores, the bail commissioner of York county, yesterday afternoon. He claims that he first fired a shot to frighten Robert Amory, and when the man continued his assaults upon him, he fired the second and probably the fatal shot in self defense.

HOUSE SITS UNTIL LATE

Lower Chamber in Session Until After Midnight Hour.

ATTENDANCE IS VERY LARGE

Business Transacted with Celerity But Amid Much Confusion at Times—Chief Work Was Disposition of Various Conference Reports.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., March 3.—On the eve of final adjournment the house of representatives today transacted its business with a facility unusual for a daying congress, although at times there was much confusion, which the speaker had difficulty in controlling.

With scarcely any debate the conference reports on the military academy, legislative, executive and judicial and penal code bills were agreed to.

The bill amending the copyright laws of the United States in regard to "canned music" was passed, as were also a large number of private bills.

Having practically wound up the consideration of all other pressing business the house, at 6:15 p. m., took a recess until 10 o'clock tonight.

House Was Thronged. When the session was resumed after the nearly four hours recess, there was a large attendance of members, while the galleries were packed to the doors. The diplomatic and executive reservations were filled to overflowing.

Most of the visitors remained until after midnight.

Mr. Sherman, of New York, the Vice President-elect, was in his accustomed place and took an active part in the proceedings.

One of the first things done at the night session was to agree to the conference report on the general deficiency appropriation bill.

Shortly before 1 o'clock Mr. Taft presented the conference report on the sundry civil bill which was agreed to after a very brief discussion.

At 1:02 p. m. the house further recessed until 10 o'clock tomorrow.

WANTS TO "MAKE GOOD" TAFT TELLS YALE ALUMNI

Will Stand Just Criticism, Won't "Care a Durn" for Unjust Criticism.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 3.—"I feel in all my bones and nerves the disposition to 'make good,'" declared President-elect Taft tonight in addressing about 700 Yale alumni at their smoker.

"I hope with nerve to be able to stand just criticism and to improve by it and not to 'care a durn' for unjust criticism."

The appearance of Mr. Taft was the signal for long applause, followed by a rousing college cheer.

"The spirit of Yale," he said, "is the spirit of democracy, every man doing his best, and if he does this, having the support of every other Yale man, that is all I ask for."

He was greeted with loud shouts of "No" when he said there had been many Yale men before him who would have been able to fill with more credit than himself, the office upon which he is about to enter.

"Many circumstances have worked together to place me where I am," he said.

"There is much luck in the coming of opportunities to men. I am glad, however, to have drawn a lucky number."

THREE CORNERED RACE.

Prince Edward Has a Trio of House Aspirants.

RICHMOND, VA., March 3.—Prince Edward county is to have one of the prettiest contests for many years when the primary election is held to name a candidate for the house of delegates to succeed John J. Owen, who has been a member of the lower branch of the general assembly for some twelve years.

All of the gentlemen are well known in the county and a pretty race is scheduled when they take the stump and begin to enlighten things by appealing to the voters for their support.

It is understood that in case Judge Mann is elected governor, Mr. Owen will aspire to succeed him in the State Senate from the district.

GEORGIA CONTINGENT.

Many Organizations Go to See Taft Inducted into Office. (By Associated Press)

ATLANTA, GA., March 3.—Atlanta's delegation which goes to participate in the inauguration parade left this morning on a special train for Washington.

This delegation includes two crack companies of the Fifth regiment, National Guard of Georgia, and the Atlanta firemen's drum and bugle corps.

The Governor's Horse Guard left on an earlier train.

It will not participate in the parade. Besides the organizations mentioned, Georgia will be represented by more than 200 cadets from the Georgia Military Academy and the Donald Frazier Military Institute, the Richmond Hussars of Augusta, Camp 435 United Confederate Veterans, the Georgia Taft Club and the "Billy Possum Mascots."

FOREST RESERVE DOOMED.

Appalachian and White Mountain Bill Dies in Senate. (By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 3.—The Appalachian and White Mountain forest reservation bill was practically finally disposed of soon after the Senate reconvened at 8:30 o'clock tonight.

When the bill was placed before the Senate tonight Senator Teller declared it would take him two or three hours to point out its defects.

Senator Flint said that it least two hours would be required by him, and Senator Dixon added that he would require two or three hours.

It was pointed out that the House had substituted an entirely new bill for the Senate measure.
