OLD DOMINION TRUST COMPANY IS CHARTERED

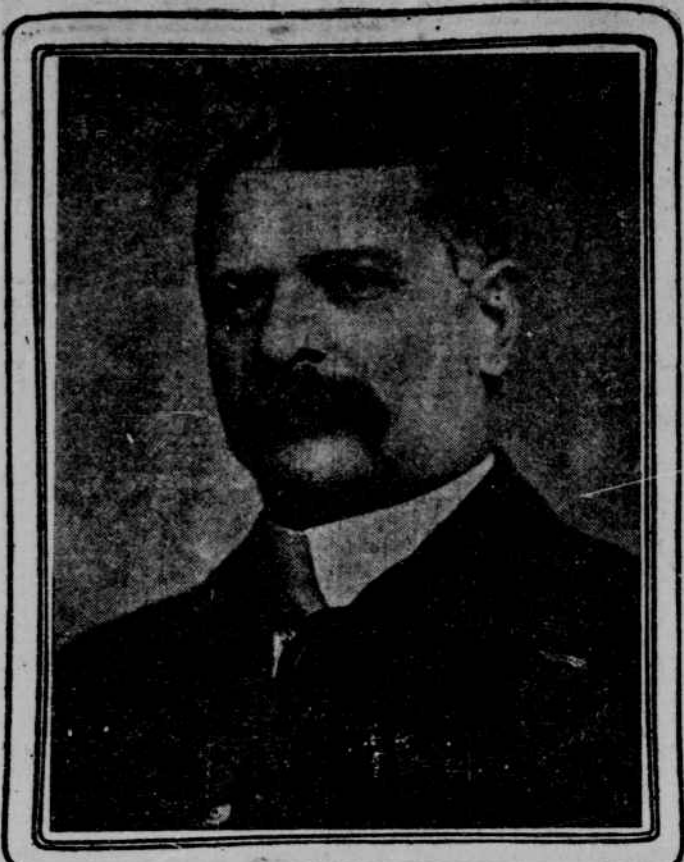

to be placed with parties, preferably outside of the city of Richmond, who can aid the company by their business and their influence. Mr. Habliston commented on the remarkable fact that applications have been made by citizens of Richmond far in excess of the amount of stock allotted here, without any advertisement or solicitation. Publication of the report that a great trust company was in process of formation was first made in The Times-Dispatch on October 31, at which time the general plan was broadly outlined, though but few of the details could then be stated with certainty.

Will Open Shortly. No definite date has been set for the opening of the doors of the company. That will be determined with other matters at the formal organization meeting on Thursday, but it will be not later than February 1. In fact, the trust company may open the first of the year, without waiting until the first National vacates the banking room it proposes to use as its permanent home.

The new company, President Habliston stated, would be in a position to finance the largest as well as the smallest of Southern enterprises, and its incorporation adds greatly to the financial prestige of Richmond, which will then have both the largest bank and the largest trust company between Baltimore and New Orleans, thereby firmly establishing its claim as the financial centre of the South. The board of directors has been selected with care as representing a varied number of large financial interests, for many of which the new trust company will serve in the nature of a clearing house. The name selected—The Old Dominion Trust Company—identifies the institution with the State, and avoids any similarity of name with that of any other banking institution.

Gets "Death Hand" and Dies. Oshkosh, Wis., November 30.—Albert Henschel, aged thirty-three, was dealt a "death hand" to-day while playing cards in a saloon. He had just won the stakes and was reaching forward for the chips when he sank back in his chair and expired. Death was due to heart failure.

TAFT COMPLETES SECOND MESSAGE

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Washington, November 30.—President Taft to-day completed the second message to Congress, which will be submitted the latter part of next week. The first message, which will go in on Tuesday, will deal exclusively with the foreign relations of the government. The second message will be devoted to general matters upon which legislation is needed. A third message will be submitted recommending the establishment of a budget system of handling governmental finances. Accompanying this message will be a sample budget framed by President Taft's Economy and Efficiency Commission. The estimates in the usual form will be sent to Congress on Monday.

American Hustle for Bernhard. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] New York, November 30.—Sarah Bernhard and her company will get an American hustle on the moment they arrive in this city on the French liner La Savoie to-morrow morning. The actress is due to appear in vaudeville in Chicago Monday afternoon under the direction of Martin Beck, and it will require celebrity on the part of everybody for her to do so. Just as soon as Mme. Bernhard's scenery and trunks can be hauled out of the hold they will be placed on transfer wagons, and the drivers will rush them to the Grand Central Station, where they will be stowed in two sixty-foot baggage cars. The actress meanwhile will hurry to her private car. Then she will personally nod "all aboard" to the conductor, and the Bernhard special will start on a fast run to Chicago.

PERFUME IS USED TO CATCH THIEF

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Chicago, November 30.—Perfume was used by detectives to-day in solving the disappearance of small sums of money from the University of Chicago Press building, and led to the arrest of a youth who said he was taking the money to buy an airplane. Three weeks ago detectives were put to work disguised as workmen, ostensibly repairing the building. They perfumed the money. To-day a young shipping clerk passed close to the business. Scentsing the perfume, the officers stopped him and demanded: "The money he had just taken." This so frightened the youth that he handed over \$2.25 he had taken from the money drawer a few minutes before. The boy later said he had taken about \$50 in the last six weeks, which he had put in a bank for the purpose of buying an airplane.

BLOW TO SMUGGLING RING. Leader of Conspirators Is Fined and Given One Year's Sentence. San Francisco, November 30.—A gigantic smuggling ring, covering the entire Pacific coast, was dealt a blow here to-day, when Robert Donaldson, assistant marine superintendent of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company and ringleader of the conspirators, was sentenced to one year's imprisonment and fined \$200 by United States Judge De Haven. Donaldson was convicted of attempting to land opium worth \$18,000 in Oakland. To date, United States District Attorney John L. McNab has obtained thirty-six smuggling indictments.

Underwood Announces His Harmony Program

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Washington, November 30.—A harmony program, whereby radical tariff revisionists in the Democratic House will endeavor to push drastic tariff cuts through the Senate, despite the small Democratic majority in the upper house, and the leading of several Democratic Senators to protective duties was announced to-night by Chairman Underwood, of the House Ways and Means Committee. Underwood's plan is to have the House frame the tariff bill or bills confer freely with the Democrats in the Senate, who will be called upon to engineer passage of the measure through the upper house. The House leader will fight for bills containing an drastic cuts as those which the House passed at the last session, and he is expected to force the support of some of the Democratic Senators who favor the measure.

"I know this fact—that I am to be President pro tempore until December 16 at least and will continue a candidate for the place if my colleagues desire." The Progressives prevented Gallinger being elected. Caution between the Democrats and Progressives has been rumored, but is not generally expected. "Progressives have offered to vote for some Republican not of the 'stand-paite' stripe, but a leading firm in refusing to vote solidly for Gallinger. Early Action Is Predicted. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Washington, D. C., November 29.—Among the arrivals for the approaching session of the Senate was Senator Simmons, of North Carolina, who is generally conceded to be in line for the chairmanship of the Finance Committee in the next Congress, and who, by virtue of that position, will have an important part in shaping the new tariff legislation. "I do not believe that a very long time will be required to put through the tariff legislation," said the Senator. "I expect the bills will come to the Senate from the House one after the other, each revising a particular schedule, but I do not know positively what plans Chairman Underwood and his colleagues have made. I believe that generally the new legislation will follow very closely the lines of the bills passed in the present Congress. Of course, some change will be necessary." The Senator believes the extra session will deal not only with the tariff, but will take up the antitrust legislation, and probably monetary legislation. Like Mr. Underwood, he believes that the chances are strong in favor of the enactment of an income tax law, provided two more States ratify the legislative amendment between now and the time the extra session meets.

Fight to Defeat Howard in Senate. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Washington, November 29.—A fight is foreshadowed in the Senate to defeat the confirmation of Clinton A. Howard as successor to Judge Cornelius Hanford. Senator Poindester is preparing to wage a determined fight to secure Howard's repudiation by the Senate. "Not for five seconds will the appointment of Howard as Federal judge so unshakable" was the statement issued to-day from Senator Poindester's office. "Letters have already been sent to every member of the Senate Judiciary Committee, and when the appointment is brought up, probably in the first or second executive session, Senator Poindester will demand that Howard's name be withdrawn or his appointment defeated. It will be shown that a great percentage of the public protest against the Howard advancement has come from Bellingham, where he lives." The charges made against Howard in the flood of letters which has come to the national capital from the Northwest is that he is too friendly to corporations and is allied with the same interests that come favor with Judge Hanford, who resigned last summer while under investigation by a congressional committee.

Losses \$20,000 on "Lucky George." [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Chicago, November 29.—"Lucky George" was the horse on which Dr. T. Kirby, former private banker, lost \$20,000 belonging to depositors at his bank. He said he played the horse to win, and it came in second. He alleged he was drawn into the betting by a man named Shea, who claimed to have advance information.

[Continued From First Page.] chairman of the House Rules Committee, is now fathering a bill to this end. With President-elect Wilson behind the plan, it was believed the measure, which has been side-tracked in the press of legislative work, would be rescued from a committee pigeon hole and enacted into law. While most of the Representatives favor the change, all Democrats who could be reached to-night insisted that whether Governor Wilson wanted it or not, they would give him a tremendous ovation when he became President. "The Governor has certainly decided upon a meritorious plan," said Representative Clayton, chairman of the Judiciary Committee, which reported the Henry resolution; but I don't know whether it will go through at this time. At any rate his endorsement will give impetus to the passage of the Henry resolution. Governor-elect Sulzer, of New York, was dubious about the plan. "It looks like two bites at a cherry," he commented. "Personally, I would like to see the pomp and ceremony part of our inaugurations eliminated. My plan is for a simple inaugural on the first of January, without any parade or inaugural ball. The President could take the oath, and go directly to the White House to get on the job." Representative Goodwin, of Arkansas, declared that Governor Wilson might find it hard to cancel plans, which the Democrats already have inaugurated for a big demonstration on March 4. "I think it probable that we Democrats will be denied the opportunity of celebrating," he said. "I believe Governor Wilson's announcement will contribute to the adoption of the Henry resolution."

New York, November 29.—"Tainted Philanthropy" was not a bit like Belasco's "The Woman," and Judge Holt, of the United States District Court, in a decision handed down this afternoon, said that Abraham Gishinsky, the Bay Ridge barber-playwright-manager, lawyer, author of "Tainted Philanthropy," was not entitled to damages from Belasco for a plagiarism. The decision was rendered after Be-
