MORTON GIVES ROWD MANY THRILLS WHEN CAR LEAVES TRACK

In Last Race on Program "Jimmy, Jr.," Does a Hurdle, Tearing Down Fence.—Driver Keeps Seat and Re-Enters Race. Louis Disbrow Takes All Honors, Winning Richmond Prize.

Yesterday's Features
Louis Disbrow drove "Jay-Eye-See" one mile in one minute flat, establishing new record for this track.
Dave Morton drove "Jimmy, Jr.," the Kline Kar, the eighth mile in the ten-mile handicap in 1:01.

William Dave Morton, racing partner with John W. Minker, with the Kline Kar, furnished the nerve which made the final day of the Richmond Automobile Club's race meet at the Virginia State Fair Grounds, one of excitement, checkfull of the spectacular, while Louis Disbrow, in his wonderful "Jay-Eye-See," attended to the matter of lowering his own record of 1:01 made Friday in the ten-mile handicap, when he spurred a mile in one minute flat.

The first burst of excitement came in the second race, a ten-mile event. The Mercer car, driven by Spencer Wishart, had taken the lead and maintained it for the first six miles, with "Jimmy, Jr.," the Kline Kar, Morton at the wheel, gradually cutting down the lead, and finally passing the Mercer as they swung into the home stretch of the seventh mile. When the eighth mile had been finished, Morton's car was second, ahead of the Mercer.
