WRIT OF ERROR
GRANTED LOONEY

URGES COUNCIL
TOWIDEN STREET

Chamber Committee Pro-nounces Bridge Approach Inadequate, and Asks for Relief.

NEED 40-FOOT ROADWAY

City Engineer Suggests Alternative Plans to Provide for Double-Track Car Line

Condemning the present approach to the new bridge as altogether inadequate to the traffic demands that will be placed upon it when the structure is completed, the Chamber of Commerce committee on streets, roads and parks, adopted a resolution yesterday afternoon calling upon the City Council to adopt remedial measures at the earliest possible date.

The committee devoted two hours to a thorough discussion of the problem and called into consultation a number of scientific business men, as well as City Engineer Bolling, to assist in arriving at a solution.

City Engineer Bolling told the committee that by far the best solution would be to widen Fourteenth Street between the bridge and Main Street to sixty feet—the same width as the bridge itself.

These two plans, put into effect together, he said, would give the desired forty-foot roadway for a double track car line, and at the same time would avoid in large part the heavy expense which would follow the widening of the street outright by condemnation of property on the western side of Fourteenth Street.

Fire Board's Request Eluded.

Chairman John C. Easley, of the chamber's streets, roads and parks committee, favored a sixty-foot street to Cary, and the condemnation of all the property on the western side of Fourteenth Street from Cary to Main, as well as the obstructing property on Main Street, to be turned into a large open square.

The committee decided not to take up for the present the question of opening a new street to Broad. City Engineer Bolling served warning that action in the matter of widening Fourteenth Street to the bridge must be taken at once, since the contract for its construction is to be completed by July 1.

Will Pave West Main Street.

By instruction, the Virginia Railway and Power Company is authorized to reconstruct its tracks on Main Street West of Rowland, it being the intention of the board to pave that portion of the street with granite spalls.

GAS WORKS TAR
FOR CITY STREETS

Administrative Board Would Use By-Product for Public Benefit

NO FIRE PUMP ON CITY TUG

Board Preparing to Pave Main Street West of Rowland

Use of tar and other by-products of the City Gas Works as a binder for macadamized streets was discussed at some length by the Administrative Board yesterday.

The general introduction of automobiles has brought about a change in street building, the old style macadam being quickly cut to pieces by the strong suction of the rear driving wheels of motor cars.

In his annual report for 1912, Special Accountant George S. Crenshaw recommended that the coal gas tar and water gas tar by-products of the gas works be used for the improvement of the roadbed of the city's streets after the expiration of the present contracts.

It was a matter of some comment at the time that the old Committee on Light Seldom, if ever, had more than one bid for the tar, but such was the case in the recent bids for city departments that no serious efforts were made at the Gas Works to aid in the improvement of the streets.

FAVOR WEST END STATION

Chamber Committee, in Informal Session, Agrees That Elba Region Is Preferable

If a union passenger station is ever built in Richmond it will be placed somewhere in the central western part of the city, and not on or near the site of the present Main Street Station of the Chesapeake and Ohio and Seaboard Air Line Railways.

Business Uptown Grows.
In the last five years, it was pointed out, the through business at Elba, the uptown station of the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac, increased 24 per cent.

One Great Problem.
The greatest obstacle in the way of a West End station, it was pointed out at the committee meeting yesterday, is the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway, which has a natural entrance into the city through Shockoe Valley.

With the Chesapeake and Ohio running into the city, it was pointed out, a West End station would still be for all practical purposes a union terminal. Most of the union stations in the country lack one or more roads, one of the conditions pointed out by the committee entering Richmond, he thought, could be brought together in a West End station, except the Chesapeake and Ohio.
