TILLMAN SPEAKS ON RACE ISSUE

Electrifies Senate in Discussing Roosevelt's Dismissal of Negro Troops

BRANDS EQUALITY AS PRESUMPTION

Declares the President, With His Northern Doctrines, Is Making the Negro Question More Formidable Every Day.

WASHINGTON, January 12.—The Senate listened to a debate on the race question today, in which Senator Tillman was the principal protagonist, and Senator Patterson, of Colorado, his opponent, which brought into striking contrast the views of the South and North on this question.

SPECIALISTS ARE INDICTED BY JURY

Physicians Must Answer to Court For Alleged Violation of Law.

INQUIRY WILL BE PROSECUTED

Attention of Grand Jury Called to Others Who Are Now Practicing Here—What Rudd and Buchanan Have to Say About Case.

Something of a quiet sensation was created yesterday when the grand jury of the Hustings Court, which had been called in special session by Judge Witt, reported an indictment against Drs. C. H. Rudd and John W. Buchanan, two well-known young neurologists, who are doing business in partnership under the firm name and style of Rudd & Buchanan at Fifth and Grace Streets.

The Indictment.

After sitting in the case for an hour or more, and hearing evidence, the jurors submitted to the court an indictment, labeled a "true bill," which read as follows: "The grand jurors of the Commonwealth, for the body of the city of Richmond, do hereby certify, present, that C. H. Rudd and John W. Buchanan, on the 24 day of January, 1907, in the year 1907, did unlawfully practice medicine and surgery as a physician and surgeon for compensation of one C. E. Samuels, without first having obtained a certificate from the State Board of Medical Examiners, and cause same to be recorded as required by law, and without having obtained a special permit from the president of the State Medical Board of Examiners in practice same, they, the said C. H. Rudd and John W. Buchanan, having begun to practice medicine and surgery as a physician and surgeon since the 1st day of January, 1907, to wit, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five."

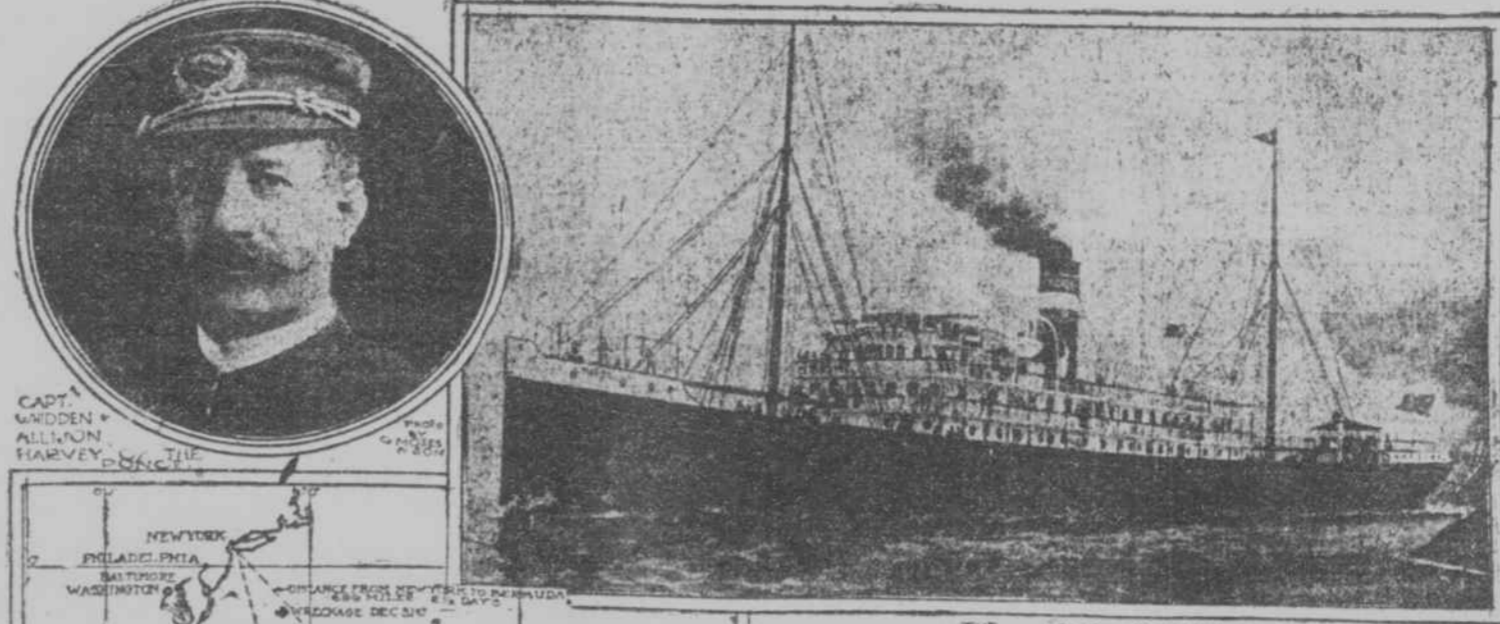
What Is Neurology?

Later in the day they were seen by a Times-Dispatch man, who called on them in their offices at Fifth and Grace Streets. They were still disposed to treat the indictment as a mere technicality, and were charged in that document with practicing as physicians and surgeons in a specific case without first having passed an examination before the State Medical Board. They declared that so far as the specific case was concerned they would have no difficulty in proving that they had not in that case practiced medicine or surgery. It was true that they had never passed an examination before the board and they had never applied to that board to examine them as to their proficiency as neurologists; it would be simply ridiculous for them to do so, as the board knows nothing whatever about the science of neurology.

Gives Nature a Chance.

"It is an entirely new system," says Dr. Buchanan. "We treat the eye as the eye, the nose as the nose, the ear as the ear, and we have nothing whatever to do with medicine or surgery. It is a new system, and a recent discovery, of which the board knows absolutely nothing, and does not profess to know anything. The eyes we have effected, or rather, we have opened the way for nature to effect, is the best evidence of the efficacy of the new system. We do not need any board's endorsement or certificate." Dr. Buchanan is a Richmond man, having been born and reared in this city. Dr. Rudd is a native of Powhatan, but has spent the most of his life in this city as a student of the classics and of medicine. Judge Witt did not indicate yesterday when the case against these specialists will be called for trial, but it will probably come on this month. The attention of the grand jury had also been called to other specialists doing business in this city, osteopaths and chiropractors. Dr. Buchanan reported to the court that the jury found it impossible to go into an investigation yesterday of these cases, but suggested that the Commonwealth's Attorney pursue his inquiry along these lines, and if he found call in the service of a special grand jury.

SOUTH TO HONOR NAME OF R. E. LEE

Centenary of Birth of Great Chieftain to be Generally Observed.

EXERCISES TO BE HELD IN RICHMOND

Services at St. Paul's—Military Parade in Afternoon and Big Meeting to Be Held at Night—Former Governor Montague to Speak.

ROBERT EDWARD LEE.

He was a foe without hate, A friend without treachery, A soldier without cruelty, A victor without oppression.

The centenary of the birth of Robert Edward Lee, on Saturday, January 19th, will be generally observed in all parts of the South as a memorial of the great chieftain. Just one hundred years ago, on the 19th of January, Robert Edward Lee was born at Stratford, Westmoreland county, Va., the home of "Light-Horse Harry Lee," of Revolutionary fame.

President Roosevelt is quoted as referring to General Lee as the greatest military leader of the Anglo-Saxon race had yet produced, not excepting Washington and Marlborough. It is not too much to say that the English-speaking world will honor the centenary of Robert Edward Lee, a hero who is here in the Southland, but it is here in the Southland, where he loved and to which he gave the best efforts of his mature manhood, that this anniversary occasion will be held most sacred. And here in Richmond, the old capital of the Confederacy and the commercial and industrial center of the great new South, the Lee memorial services will center.
