Board of Aldermen

At a regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen held Tuesday, November 23, 1920, there were present:

F. F. Marbury, esq., president and Messrs. Robinson, Ballenger, Wilkins, Batschelet.

Resolutions appropriating \$1600 for the automatic bell ringers in the fire engine houses, laid on the table November 9, 1920, was taken up and passed by the following vote. Ayes, 5; Noes 0.

The following papers received from the lower board and their action concurred in:

Ordinance to prohibit the sale, exchange and delivery of bread in the city of Alexandria, Va., unless the same shall be closely wrapped and sealed, passed, Ayes 5; Noes 0.

Ordinance regulating the sale, exchange and delivery of milk and cream providing for the cleansing of milk and cream within the city of Alexandria.

Petition granting Carter Bros. permission to repair house 310 South Pitt Street.

Petition from the Alexandria Hospital for relief of taxes on the lot on North Columbus street, laid over.

Petition from sundry citizens objecting to the stable of the Mt. Vernon Dairy.

Petition from Reid and Popkins regarding the removal of stable of Mt. Vernon Dairy.

Bill of Mrs. Baggett for \$13.00 for cleaning out sewer running through her premises.

Ordinance regulating the price of gas.

Resolution making a loan to the city gas works of \$25,000 to pay for new water set, coal and other incidental expenses.

Petition from W. J. McCaffrey regarding the poor gas furnished.

Resolution appropriating \$335 to

pay balance due on two motorcycles. Petition from the Mt. Vernon chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Common Council

At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Alexandria, Va., held November 23rd, 1920, there were present:

H. R. Burke, esq., president and Messrs. McCaffrey, Matter, Ruben, Ticer, Downham, Wattles, Desmond, Drury, Sullivan, Baggett, Ballenger, Lawler, Fletcher and Devers.

An ordinance to prohibit the sale, exchange and delivery of bread in the city of Alexandria, unless the same shall be closely wrapped and sealed as herein provided for, and providing a penalty for a violation, was recommended by the committee on health and read the second and third time and passed. Ayes 14; Noes 0.

An ordinance regulating the sale, exchange and delivery of milk and cream, providing for the cleansing of milk and cream bottles, within the City of Alexandria, Va., was recommended by the committee on health and read the second and third time and passed. Ayes 14; Noes 0.

A resolution offered by Mr. Fletcher instructing the health officer to furnish dealers in bread a copy of

the bread law was passed. A resolution by Mr. Fletcher instructing the health officer to furnish milk dealers a copy of the milk law was passed.

A resolution by Mr. Fletcher appropriating the sum of \$350 to pay balance due on two motorcycles, was passed; Ayes Messrs. McCaffrey, Matter, Ruben, Ticer, Downham, Wattles, Desmond, Drury, Ballenger, Lawler, Fletcher, Devers and Mr. President—13; Noes Messrs. Sullivan and Baggett—2.

A communication from the Board of Trustees of the Alexandria Hospital requesting that taxes assessed for the Columbus Street property against the hospital, amounting to \$542.42 be remitted, was received. And a resolution offered by Mr. Ticer appropriating the sum of \$542.42 to reimburse the hospital for the amount of taxes assessed, was passed, Ayes 14 Noes 0.

The following permissions were granted:

To the Daughters of the American Revolution to erect mile stone on the east side of Russell Road.

Also to Carter Bros. for alteration to porches rear of 310 South Pitt Street.

Also to L. W. Recker to widen garage at No. 206 South Fayette Street.

An act to regulate and fix the price of gas was read the first time and referred to the joint committee on light and finance.

A resolution to make a loan of \$25,000 to construct water set and other expenses of the city gas works was offered by Mr. Wattles and referred to the joint committee on light and finance to be reported at a special meeting to be held Friday night, November 26th at 7.30 o'clock.

A communication from Mr. McCaffrey relating to the condition at the city gas works was referred to the committee on light.

A communication from Mr. McCaffrey relating to the police force and the health department was referred to the joint committee on police and health.

A communication from James R. Caton, attorney for Mrs. Baggett, relating to a sewer running through her premises used by property owners in the sub-division of her land was referred to the joint committee on streets and finance.

A petition from R. L. Ladue, to erect garage at No. 426 North Fayette street was referred to the Committee on Streets.

A petition from property owners protesting against a shed used for a stable by the Mt. Vernon Dairy at the corner of Prince and Alfred Streets was referred to the committee on streets.

A petition from W. F. Reid and L. A. Popkins, owners of the Mt. Vernon Dairy, at corner of Alfred and Prince Street, requesting that they be allowed to retain a shed erected on their property without a permit was referred to the committee on streets.

REFUSE JAIL BATH:

SEARCH NETS \$1,200 Roanoke, Va., Nov. 24.—William Porter, alias William Harris, and Charles Carter, held here in connection with the robbery of the Glasgow, Va., bank early last Friday, upon refusal to take baths, aroused suspicions of jail attendants last night, and a search of their persons resulted in the finding of \$1,200, the police announced today.

Seven \$100 bills were discovered in a bandage on Porter's abdomen, which, according to the police, the prisoner claimed was placed there following a recent operation. Another \$100 bill was found sewed in the lining of Porter's vest, the police said. They added that four \$100 bills were discovered in Carter's underwear.

This money, with \$450 found on the body of James B. Rogers, who was killed in a gun fight with local police Friday, makes a total of \$1,650 in currency taken from the trio, in addition to \$96,253 in liberty

bonds and securities, discovered in a barracks bag. Chief of Police Rigney announced last night that a thorough reexamination will be made of the seven passenger automobile, in which the robberies at points other than Glasgow were halted Friday. Identity of the three men and whether they were connected with robberies has not been definitely established, the police said.

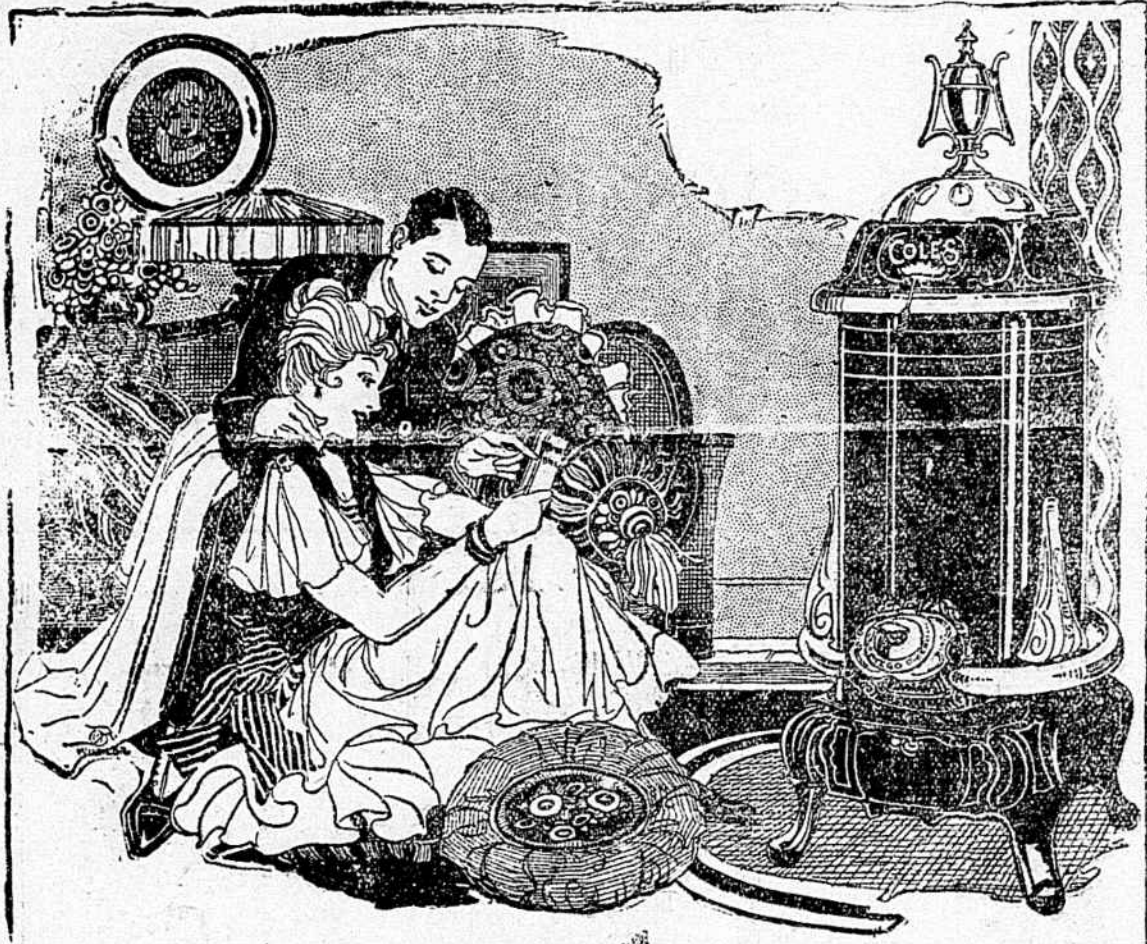
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
