VIRGINIA NEWS NOTES.

Hems Gathered Here and There and Everywhere Throughout the State.

Rev. Sam Jones received \$1,200 for a week's preaching at the Methodist Base-Ball Club, whose collar-bone was broken twice Saturday in a game with the Roanoke Athletic Club team, was resting quietly at last accounts.

A colored boy named John Penn, while standing on an empty whisky barrel in Alexandria, Monday, was struck by a cracker in the bung and the barrel exploded, blowing off both his legs.

Mr. John Taylor Thornton, of Port Royal, has purchased the splendid estate known as "Belle Grove," in Westmoreland county, on the Rappahannock river. This old manor house was the birthplace of President Madison.

Ashby Platter, aged about twenty-one years, a son of Mr. Joseph Painter, of Page county, was run over and killed by the north-bound passenger train on the Norfolk and Western at the station on Monday evening near Ingham station, about ten miles south of Luray.

Mr. Charles B. Shelton, of Pittsylvania county, who was practicing law in Richmond, died there Saturday. His remains were interred Sunday at his father's home in Chalk level, in that county, with Masonic honors. He was an honest and industrious young man.

Charles Jones, foreman of the Glamorgan machine shop, Lynchburg, met with a painful accident Tuesday morning. He was attempting to hammer a nail when he attempted to throw it off, when his right arm was caught and drawn on the shaft, breaking it in two places, and the radical artery was burst.

Mat Holbrook, who a year or more ago shot and dangerously wounded a woman in the vicinity of Mount Hermon church, Pittsylvania county, has been arrested in Robeson county, N. C., upon information furnished the authorities of North Carolina by Sheriff Overby. He will be brought here and arrested at Brunswick, Va., by Detective Eugene Robertson, of the Norfolk and Western railroad, upon information furnished by Sheriff Overby.

Andy Bandy, a drunken Irish umbrella mender, was struck by the Roanoke-bound electric car Monday night, while asleep on the track, and received two cuts on his head, which caused the skull. He would have been killed instantly had the pilot not knocked him from the track. Though almost crazy now, it is thought he will recover.

William Marcey, residing in Alexandria county, on the road between Hall's Well and the Chain Bridge, blew out his brains Saturday evening. He used a 2-caliber revolver for his weapon and was so successful that his brains were scattered about the room where the deed was committed. He had been drinking, and was thought to be crazy when he killed himself. He leaves a wife and several children.

Captain John L. Toper has purchased the present Germantown Methodist Episcopal church building, a valuable property, on the corner of Granby and Freemason streets, Norfolk, for \$15,000, for the purpose, it is thought, of establishing a central station for Methodist mass-meetings a year ago, and has been engaged in modifying the plans, and the new \$100,000 church is to be commenced early in September.
