

ANOTHER SPOILS RUSH

EXPECTED WITH THE OPENING OF THE EXTRA SESSION.

Chief in the Departments Already Preparing for the Rush When Congress Opens.—Washington News.

That another rush of office-seekers is expected here with the opening of the extra session of Congress, next month, was shown this morning by a remark made by one of the chief officers of an important department. The offices in all of the public buildings are very handsomely carpeted for the winter months, but at the approach of a warm wave in the spring breezes give way to Canton carpeting, which is where most of the matting is laid.

As regards this change in the carpeting, it may be said that the White House has been the scene of the same metamorphosis, which was begun in the lower portion of the house soon after the opening of the extra session of Congress.

Superintendent of Public Buildings and Parks Wilson, in his last report, has upon the executive offices away from the living quarters of the President and his family, and makes a suggestion that they be taken to the new building on the present site of the White House conservatory.

Mr. Editor: The article in your issue of to-day (Tuesday, 11th July), showing how small a part is played by the national banks in supplying currency to the country, ought to lead to a consideration of the question as to how far it is worth while to perpetuate such a system. It is true that the national banks supply currency to the country, but they supply a currency good all over the country, but do they do this at a cost to the country.

capital invested in it, and whose interest it is to make the best and wisest use of their own ability in the conduct of their business. This is the national bank system, as they are tied down to the use of their capital and subjected to the control of inspectors, appointed not by those who find the capital, but by politicians, who have nothing at stake in the successful failure of such a system is a failure which is evidenced every day. Those who need money cannot get it, because they are unable to provide the exact kind of security which the law allows, whilst those who ought not to be loaned in their cases get it because they are shrewd enough to know how to drive a coach and six through the statute. Then, again, its failure is shown by the constant, yet daily, reports of the failure of banks through the defaults of their officers—failures which could not occur if the system of Government inspection was worth anything at all.

There need be no difficulty in the management of the bank, and there is no national bank and no treasury department issuing money of any kind. The Bank of England and the Bank of France have special charters from the governments. Under the terms of which, for certain purposes, they are empowered to issue banknotes, and have the sole right of issue in the respective countries. The management of these two great institutions, however, is entirely in the hands of those who are not the directors, but are the directors and look after their own interests. There are no Government inspectors of banks in either country. All the other banks in England certainly, and in France so far as I know, are simply managed in the ordinary way of business, which they manage themselves, and without any power to issue notes or currency of any kind, except gold and silver, which they obtain in England from the Bank of England and in France from the Bank of France.
