

ACTION OF THE HOUSES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 26.—The prevailing impression as to the probable action of the two houses finds expression as follows.

The vote on the Wilson Repeal Bill will be taken up on Monday in the House, and the silver purchase clause of the Sherman law, as far as that body is concerned, will be wiped out of existence.

The bill will then go to the Senate, where it will be referred to the Finance Committee, which will promptly pigeon-hole it. The Senate will go straight along taking it up, as it has been doing for several days. It will do this for two weeks, and probably longer, before the final vote will be taken.

The Voorhees bill only differs from the Wilson bill in making a declaration in favor of installment.
