

CLEVELAND IS HONEST BUT HE HAS BEEN VERY BADLY FOOLED AND MISLED.

By Says the Honorable Jerry Simpson, the Sockless Statesman, in His Speech at Old Market Hall Last Night.

About 400 people were present at the Old Market Hall last night to hear Hon. Jerry Simpson, of Kansas, speak. The crowd was made up chiefly of Populists, though a few Democrats were in attendance. There was no lack of enthusiasm.

Secretary Harris, of the State committee, in a short speech, introduced the speaker of the evening. Mr. Harris said, among other things, "Mr. Simpson is known throughout the country as 'Sockless Jerry,' but I want to say that a man can be just as happy without socks as he can with them. His oratorical ability was not a bit less than that of the man who was blissfully happy without a shirt on his back. He persuaded Mr. Simpson, who addressed the audience as 'Lasses and Gentlemen,' to look around to see only socks in the audience, and had to stage his address to 'Ladies and Gentlemen.'

Mr. Simpson said he was present not in the interest of any organization, but in the interest of the people. He dealt himself out to call Congress together to settle the greatest question that is now agitating the minds of the American people—the financial question.

He pleaded with every one present to go to the polls and vote according to the dictates of his conscience, and paid a glowing tribute to the recent cooperation of the past record and applauded the recent manly and strong stand taken by Senator Daniel in regard to the silver question. The citizens of Virginia could not vote for the Democratic party because it had reversed its policy. The Republican party was out of the question, for that party had no policy.

He was warmly applauded in his reference to the glorious past of Virginia, and to the bold attack of Senator Daniel towards the silver question.

Mr. Simpson took occasion to ridicule the various plans adopted by business men to promote their interests and used many strong expressions of disapproval in regard to the attitude of Mr. Cleveland towards the silver question. He alluded to the "tender-footed" vote of the political "tender-footed" but he thanked God that every four years the party in power had to give to the people an account of their administration.

The speaker then attacked the policies of both the Democratic and Republican parties, declaring that neither in great question nor the Federal election law, as agitated by the two parties, would have any material effect upon the condition of the people, and emphasized the doctrine of taking taxes from the pockets of the people as far as possible. The People's party believed in dispensing with tariff as far as possible, and in allowing every citizen to purchase what he wants wherever he can get it cheapest.

Mr. Simpson complimented the fairness with which the Richmond press had dealt with the People's party, at the same time speaking strongly against the press and misrepresentation practiced by the Western press.

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RECEIVER APPOINTED.

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At the end of the twenty-third ballot eleven votes were cast in favor of Major Boykin and nine in favor of Major Eaker. It then being nearly 5 o'clock, a recess was then taken until 6 P. M., and it again repaired to the Davis House, where Commander Sergeant John C. Small had spread an elegant dinner.

Shortly after 6 o'clock the meeting was again called to order by General Anderson, and the voting was once again taken up. The several ballots did not bring any improvement for either candidate, but at the end of the thirty-third ballot the vote stood again ten to ten, and it was decided at 9:30 P. M. to postpone all further balloting.

A vote of thanks was passed for Colonel Wickham and the officers of the staff of the regiment for the elegant dinner given them at the Davis House.

A vote of thanks was also accorded to General Anderson, who had kindly given his time to act as presiding officer. The meeting then adjourned.

The Board of Aldermen called a meeting in the Council chamber last evening at 7 o'clock to take some action in regard to the grading of some streets in the Lee district. Last month the Common Council had adopted a resolution providing for the grading of the streets.

A three-fourths vote being required to amend the resolution, on motion of Mr. Allan the sergeant-at-arms was sent to the streets to see what was being done. A report was received from the Finance Committee recommending the adoption of a resolution appropriating the sum of \$500 to be expended by the Board on Grounds and Buildings in the construction of Jefferson Park. The resolution was adopted.

In view of the fact that three-fourths of the membership could not be secured, the consideration of the Lee district matter had to be postponed to some future meeting, and the Board adjourned.

The German-American Association held a meeting in Sanger Hall last evening to receive reports from the various committees in regard to the recent celebration of German Day. President A. von Rosenzweig was in the chair and Secretary Th. Mosker recorded.

The secretary submitted a partial report, giving the receipts of the day as \$135, and the expenses as \$135. He also expressed his thanks for the success of the festival. The report was received, and the president explained that the financial condition of the organization had been considerably improved.
