The meeting of the gubernatorial inauguration committee at the city yesterday evening was postponed, to take place this afternoon at 5 o'clock, in Mayor Elyson's office, when the final arrangements for the parade and inaugural ceremonies will be completed. Mayor Elyson yesterday received a letter from Governor-Elect O'Ferrall which says: "We will leave here (Harrisonburg) next Saturday morning, by special train, at 7:30 a. m. My traveling coach will be attached to the 8:15 train, which will put us in Richmond at 2 P. M. We will stop at the Exchange."

FIRE ON GROVE AVENUE. A Building Damaged to the Extent of One Thousand Dollars.

A fire occurred yesterday about 1:30 o'clock in a one-story brick building owned by the West End Land Company, on Grove avenue. The alarm was turned in from box 145, at the corner of the streets, Engines Nos. 5 and 6 responded, but as the house was some distance out, they did not get there in time to check the flames before they had done over \$1,000 damage. The fire was caused by a gas start, and much difficulty was experienced in extinguishing it. It is thought that some tramps, who were in an adjoining stable, set the place on fire, but they have not yet been apprehended.

THE COMMITTEE PLEASED. Mr. Sheppard's Model to be Cast in Bronze by the First of May.

The clay model for the heroic figure of a Confederate soldier, fifteen feet high, to go on the private soldiers' and sailors' monument, designed by Mr. W. L. Sheppard, of this city, has been inspected and accepted by the committee. The committee were very much pleased with the work. Two or three minor alterations they suggested will be made. The figure, which is to be cast in bronze, will be completed by next May, at which time the unveiling will probably take place.

Mr. Goddin's Condition. Mr. E. C. Goddin, Jr., who was so dangerously hurt by being run over by a street-car in Baltimore on Monday, was no better yesterday.

A telegram was received by the family which stated that young Goddin was doing well. The telegram made no mention as to whether his injured limbs had been amputated. Mr. Goddin has gone to Baltimore to be with his son. The following special was received from Baltimore last night: Mr. E. C. Goddin, Jr., the young man who was run over by a cable car here yesterday, is now lying at the City Hospital in a critical condition, and his recovery is hardly expected by the doctors at the hospital. Dr. Charles H. Hart, who operated on his legs to-day, and says the other will have to be amputated also. The father of the unfortunate young man arrived in the city to-night. He is very anxious to see his son left in Baltimore for this Sunday night on a visit. Charles Elliott, gripman of the car, is out on bail to await the result of Goddin's injuries. He says that Goddin fell under the car.
