

STORM BAD IN NORTH CAROLINA

The Snow Falling for Fifty Hours and Unabated.

NO MAILS ARE MOVING.

The Temperature the Lowest Ever Known and the Snow Fifteen Inches Deep—The Trains Are All Annulled on Account of It.

WELDON, N. C., Feb. 13.—Special.—The snow storm is the worst ever known here. No trains can move. Two engines hitched together were unable to move on the yard today the wrecking train which arrived at 6 P. M. to get a freight train from under the snow.

No mails have arrived to-day. Snow has been falling fifty hours, and the indications point to more to-night.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN, N. C., February 13.—Special.—To-day the snow is considerably drifted, covering the ground in this section. The mercury fell to six this morning.

THE MORMONS OF ENGLAND.

A Curious Religious Sect Which Has Just Lost Its Leader.

The announcement, which was made a few days ago, that Brother Prince had departed this life at his home in Quarry, near Bridgewater, England, conveyed very little to those who read the small news items in the papers, but to those whose memories could carry them back for forty years the information recalled one of the most striking instances of religious imposture and religious fanaticism that has ever been known.

Half a century ago Rev. Henry James Prince was a popular clergyman in the Church of England. He was an eloquent preacher and the adoration with which he was regarded by his parishioners suggested the idea of seceding from the established church and starting in business for himself as a Divine Personage.

Monstrous as the idea was it was not long before "Brother Prince," as he called himself, had scores of followers. Prince devoted his efforts chiefly to the conversion of wealthy persons and in order that he might better promote the interests represented by himself he established a home for his faithful followers. He called this home the "Abode of Love of the Children of the Resurrection," this being the name that he had given the sect.

The house was luxuriously furnished, the monastic rules laid down were not the least of its peculiarities.

THE ALGER JUNKET.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Special.—Secretary Alger has invited the Military Affairs Committee of the Senate and House to visit Cuba with him. It is given out that the visit is official, hence a government transport is to be used. It is learned, however, that the Secretary expects to have a private yacht.

The Democratic members and several Republicans on both committees have decided not to accept the invitation. Even should they feel that the government's expense in an extra session grows more probable every day, and as the Alger excursion is to start March 6th, this would interfere especially, as the services of the Military Affairs Committee of both houses will probably be needed, Representative Hay, of Virginia, is a member of the House Committee.

Senator Daniel and Messrs. Hay and Vest were the only members of the Virginia delegation who succeeded in getting through the storm to-day. No business of importance was taken up for final action.
