

MR. HAMRICH HAS YIELDED. Mr. B. R. Lacy is Now Labor Commissioner of North Carolina. POPULIST OFFICIAL IS POPULAR.

Democrats Urged to Renominate Superintendent of Schools Mebane, Captain Day's Case Argued, Looking After Fish Hatchery.

RALEIGH, N. C., March 18.—Special. Mr. Hamrich, ex-Labor Commissioner, conceded late yesterday to yield his office to Mr. B. R. Lacy, who was appointed by the Legislature to succeed Mr. Hamrich. He at first refused to surrender it.
