

MARKET SHOWED SOME ADVANCES

While Generally Heavy, With Rather Dull Dealings.

PRICES OF BONDS WERE HIGHER

NEW YORK, April 25.—Dealings in stocks to-day were rather dull. The market was generally heavy in the forenoon, especially among those stocks which had been most depressed early.
