TO USE OUR COAL.

France Making Inquiries Looking to Its Use in Her Navy.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The French government is making inquiries as to American coal with a view to adopting it for the use of the French navy. To this end the Minister of Marine in the French Cabinet has instructed Lieutenant DeParandant, naval attaché of the French Embassy here, to examine the American coal new in use on American warships.

NO GERMAN RECIPROCITY YET.

Effect on the Negotiations of Reichstag's Action on the Meat Bill. WASHINGTON, May 10.—The outlook for a reciprocity treaty with Germany is regarded as having been greatly prejudiced by the action of the committee of the Reichstag in the opinion of the negotiators.

TO COLONIZE OIL LANDS.

A Company Organized in Wisconsin With \$5,000,000 Capital.

KENOSHA, WIS., May 10.—The Wau-bun Colonization and Improvement Company, with a paid-up capital of \$5,000,000, was organized here to-day with William M. Cowell, of Kenosha, as president. The central office will be in this city. It is composed of large land firms and the Chicago Loan and Trust Company, of Chicago. The company now controls over 99,000 acres of coal and oil lands in Virginia, and these lands will be opened for colonization at once. Large tracts of land in Price, Lincoln, Ashland and Osaleta counties, in the States have been purchased and will be colonized. The company has also large holdings in Florida, Nebraska and the Dakotas.
