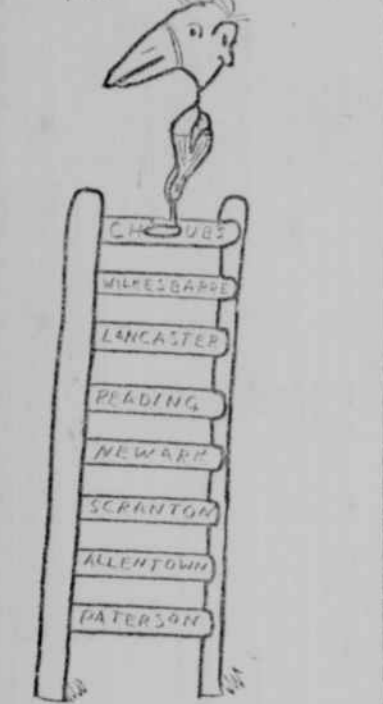
Played All Around Wilkesbarre Reading Wins from Paterson and the Allentown-Scranton Game Postponed—Wet Grounds.

TEACHERS IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Appointments for the Year Are Made.

CHANGES IN THE PERSONNEL

Some Names are Substituted and Promotions are Made—A List of Those Who Were Appointed.

The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held at the rooms of the board in the city yesterday evening. Those present were J. Taylor Elliott, chairman, Joseph C. Dickerson, (vice-chairman), James H. Capers, A. L. Phillips, Reuben Barton, Charles Hutzler, P. C. Ebel, R. E. Shine, W. M. Turpin, W. F. Fox, superintendent, and C. P. Welford, clerk.

The superintendent made his annual report, which shows total enrollment for the session, 13,308 pupils; average daily attendance, 8,629; per cent of attendance, 63.8.

The result of the examinations at the close of the session showed by buildings an average of 82.7 per cent of 82.7 per cent; in colored schools, 81.2 per cent; in entire system white and colored, 82.1 per cent; in primary grades 82.9 per cent; in grammar grades, 82.5 per cent; in high school grades; in the entire system, 72.7 per cent.

A GHOSTLY STORY. A Man Sees the Lower Half of His Body Carried from the Room. CHARLOTTE, N. C., June 26.—A white man named Parsons, whose home was at Lenoir, N. C., was run over by a Southern railway train late last night thirty miles north of here. His body was brought to Charlotte and lived about thirty minutes after teaching here. His body was entirely severed just below the waist, and while lying on a stretcher, talking to a physician, the unfortunate man saw the lower half of his body removed to another part of the room and commented upon it. He told his name and talked to the doctor that he had only a few more minutes to live and asked that he be given something to stop the pain. The doctor administered an opiate and Parsons became quieter and died in a few minutes.

SATISFACTORY REPORT. General O'Donnell's detailed report of the condition existing in the Philippines is considered very satisfactory at the War Department.
