SKETCH OF MR. MORGAN. Rev. Cary E. Morgan was born in Johnson county, Indiana, in 1859. He received his college education at Butler College, Indianapolis, now Indianapolis University. He received the bachelor's degree in 1882 and the masters' degree in 1885. He was married in Indianapolis to Miss May Daily, one of the daughters of a prominent family in 1884. Mr. Morgan was ordained with the Indianapolis Southern in a short time and commenced his work as a minister in 1885, taking the pastorate of the church at Warsaw, Ind., where he remained for seven years. He was called to the Methodist Episcopal church at Christ, Mississippi, in 1892.

His work at Christ, Miss. Mr. Morgan is one of the best known clergymen in his denomination, and is generally on the programme for an evening at the national convention. He has had remarkable success in the work in Mississippi, and the church with which he is connected has tripled its membership in five years. The people of Seventh-Street church think they are exceedingly fortunate in securing this able preacher. He has a national reputation as a pulpit orator among the people of his denomination. Mr. Morgan is six feet tall, rather slender, has wavy black hair and black mustache. He is a man of most engaging manners, a brilliant conversationalist and a man who makes friends wherever he goes. He is said to earn a million and a half.

The Richmond friends of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and of Rev. Dr. E. Y. Ryland, one of the trustees who was present, some interesting facts about the meeting and about the conclusions reached by the board are learned.

There were three nominations for the office of Professor F. H. Kerfoot, of the chair of systematic theology in the seminary, who has been several times proposed for the office: Rev. Charles Manly, of Missouri, and Rev. E. Y. Mullins, D. D., now of Newton Centre, Mass.

Dr. Ryland further said that unmistakable evidence had been given since the meeting, that the choice meets with, if not universal, approval all through the Southern Baptist Convention. It is not known whether the board will accept. He is delightfully situated, and no one can tell whether he will consent to surrender present quiet and a successful ministry in one of the great and most important intellectual and religious centers of the country for a more arduous and a more difficult position in the world, but there is great desire, cordially manifested, that he shall come.
