The most interesting feature of the proceedings of yesterday was the announcement of the speaker of the House.

As was expected, there were some surprises. Speaker Saunders will always disregard precedent if he thinks by so doing he can best serve the interests of the people. Two gentlemen who were not members of the House at the last session secured the most important chairmanships.

Mr. M'Raë of Petersburg, will preside over the committee on Judiciary and Mr. Hubbard of Buckingham over Privileges and Elections. Mr. M'Raë was a member of the House a few years ago and Mr. Hubbard served some fifteen years ago.

Mr. Hubbard's record is a unique one. He has served in the Legislature at the same session, in 1885 in an Assembly, in the Senate in the district now represented by Mr. Flood and for the Legislature of 1885, 1886 and 1887.

The committee will be announced in a few days. As was stated by the Times of last week, the following are the chairmen who will succeed themselves: Privileges and Elections—H. D. Flood, Finance—Henry Fairfax, Roads—John A. Mason, Commerce—James M. McWhorter, Education—B. Stoddard, Public Institutions—W. Morris, Fish and Game—C. W. Leake, Police—John N. O'Connell.

Mr. M'Raë will succeed Mr. Mason as chairman of the committee on Privileges and Elections. Mr. Hubbard will succeed Mr. M'Raë as chairman of the committee on Judiciary.
