

BOARD MAKES UP THE QUESTION

Lee Camp Investigation Comes Up at the Monthly Meeting.

NO ACTION WAS TAKEN.

President Randolph's Communication to Senator Ople Endorsed—Full Opportunity Will Be Afforded the Legislative Committee.

The Board of Visitors of Lee Camp Soldiers' Home, at its regular monthly meeting last night, addressed itself to the matter of investigation of the Home by a legislative committee.

The matter of the investigation was taken up at 8 o'clock. The President introduced the subject by referring to the newspaper announcements of a petition for an investigation.

Major Randolph's statement of the communication he had addressed to Senator Ople met with the entire approval of Governor Tyler and other members of the committee.

The understanding was reached that upon the appointment of the members of the committee to be named, the president will at once notify the committee of the willingness of the Board to cooperate.

TRANSFER OF THE HOME. Before the subject was discussed, attention was directed to the compact entered into in 1892 between Lee Camp and the State of Virginia.

The fact was pointed out in connection with a statement that a proposition was under consideration by the members of the Legislature to foreclose the agreement and sell the Home with the purpose of establishing it elsewhere remote from the city.
