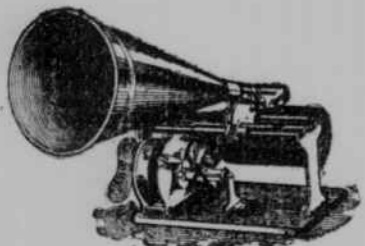

## LIVE STOCK

### TO PREVENT KICKING.

How to Cure Horses of a Vicious Habit That Usually Is the Direct Result of Idleness.

Kicking in the barn is generally done by horses kept idle too long or because of viciousness. Severe injury may result, especially in winter, when horses are kept sharply shod. The illustration shows how to prevent kicking. Put shackles on each of the hind legs and chain them together. Give

horses sufficient liberty to step about and to lie down and get up. The shackles should be put on horse a week before putting on sharp shoes, so as to get the horse accustomed to them that he may not hurt himself. Self-calking is about the only injury to be feared from using shackles. It is best to use them on horses only in the daytime at first. Shackles should be of a strong strip tied around each leg above the ankle joint. Use a light but strong chain about 12 inches long with a small ring attached to each end to pass strap through. A double leather strap for coupling instead of a chain may be used if preferred.—Louis Olsen, in Farm and Home.

### WAYS OF THE SHEEP.

In Many Respects the Most Interesting, as Well as the Most Profitable, of Farm Animals.

The sheep is a most interesting and entertaining animal. It has interrogating eyes, careful step and a pleading voice.

Innocence shines in a lamb's face, peace and harmlessness live in his intelligent eyes.

Quick to discern danger, the sheep is often unwise in his movements to avoid it.

Proud of her offspring, the experienced ewe proves her devotion and maternal affection by keeping it near her side when passing through strange gates.

The sheep appreciates generous attention and manifests his fondness of it by smiling at the feed basket.

There is a strange affinity between the sheep and the dog. Although the latter sometimes dines on an innocent lamb, where the dog has been intelligently trained he will evince a most remarkable anxiety for the welfare of his heavy-coated friend. Frequently do they play together for hours without incurring each other's displeasure. To do this the dog must exercise more intelligence than the sheep.—Farmers' Voice.

**Harness Goes with Horse.**  
 Whenever a horse is sold the harness in which it has been used to working ought always to go with the bargain. No two harnesses fit alike, especially where the pressure comes on the shoulder or neck in drawing. The skin under the old harness has been gradually toughened by the pressure on one spot. But with the new harness the pressure is shifted, it may be only an inch or two, but it comes where the skin is tender and will quickly break when exposed to the collar. If the whole harness cannot go, be at least sure to secure the collar with any new horse purchased, so the animal can work without being tortured. The collar once used for one horse ought never to be used for another.—Midland Farmer.

**How to Prevent Black Leg.**  
 The cause of "black leg" in cattle is the bacillus anthracis, a vegetable organism. This bacillus establishes the diseases known as anthrax, which occurs in various forms, such as splenic apoplexy, gloss anthrax, carbuncular erysipelas, etc. The term "black leg" is used for the disease occurring in young, thrifty cattle, because on skinning the affected quarter the flesh is black. Remedies, as a rule, fail. Your only plan is to use preventive measures. Usually when one animal is affected others follow, unless means to prevent further infection are used, and as the disease is fatal as a rule, quick action is called for. Remove all two-year-olds and under from the pasture where disease started.—Rural World.

**Eggs in the Early Spring.**  
 Eggs have brought good prices this winter, and they give more profit in proportion to the cost of the materials entering into their composition than any other animal product on farms. If the flock is large and but few eggs are secured, it may be due either to too much grain, a lack of animal food or to having too many hens for the space occupied. It is a mistake to keep more fowls than can be accommodated simply to wait for the warm weather of spring for them to begin laying. Cut off all the unprofitable members of the flock.
