1. Election of two (2) members to serve on the Export Tariff Commission in accordance with Regulations established March 31, 1840.
2. Colonial Council Bill No. 18
Continuation of 1st discussion on Colonial Council Bill No. 18, draft of an ordinance to authorize the Governor to sell at public auction the public property known as "Gallows Bay" in Christiansted District. With Committee Report.

Radio News

Washington:—Soviet Russia realizes war with Japan may come and is prepared for it, William C. Bullitt, America's first Ambassador to the Soviet Union said today. Back to report to President Roosevelt on his brief visit to Moscow as American Envoy, Bullitt confirmed reports that war clouds threaten the Far East. "Soviet Russia", he said, "is sincerely striving to maintain peace, no country in the world except possibly the United States wants peace more than the Soviet. However Soviet Russia realizes war may come and is prepared for it." asked whether the Soviet Government was taking any measures to prepare the Russian people for the possibility of war with Japan, Bullitt replied, no efforts were being made to conduct any "Hate Campaign" but that war would not be exactly a surprise if it should come.

Rome:—Italy will submit shortly to interested governments a new disarmament proposal, designed to end that existing deadlock and give Germany a measure of satisfaction, it was said reliably today. The proposals were agreed upon in the recent conversations between Premier Benito Mussolini and Sir
