Yes, gentlemen, you could have the charter incorporated in the United States, but you could not put in 'eminent domain;' and that member is, I feel, entitled to his name, and he is the honorable 3rd member for Frederiksted Country District. He was the one who said so. Do you, gentlemen, see the reason why it was brought here? Because this very important part cannot be imposed on you except you put the rope around your own neck. And when you do that, gentlemen, posterity will always thank you for it. They cannot do it. If they could, our Governor would not have brought it down here. You will note that the bill offers lots of things. Offers of jobs are made to secure the passage of this bill. But do you know, gentlemen, that attempted bribery and an acceptance of bribery are punishable? Please bear that in mind. Then again, why this haste? We were told in conference that the price of the rum market is going down. Can you, gentlemen, see that three months from now will make much difference, so much so that you must tie the knot in twenty-four hours? I cannot see anything else but that this is meant to fool the people. This is the work of slick politicians. I maintain that in passing this ordinance we are setting up a SUPER-GOVERNMENT, we are putting up a government over our own. I feel that the day this bill is passed and I, as Chairman of the Council, will have to sign it I would be doing so against my will. I prefer not to be present, but I will not shirk my duty. You are talking about this Colonial Council being a rubber stamp, if this bill comes into force and effect you will only be a postage stamp; and unless some collector collect you to see the specimen you are you would have no ghost of a chance to be seen again. You will find that Section 3 (c) gives the right to acquire anything, and what is there to prevent them
